Temple University's Department of Public Safety is proud to announce an update regarding our ongoing partnership with the Philadelphia Police Department (PPD) and our shared commitment to the safety and well-being of our community. In partnership with PPD, we launched a new deployment initiative on January 5th in the Temple University patrol zone. PPD will assign additional PPD Bicycle Police Officers and a Sergeant to work directly in and around our patrol area. The goals of this initiative are to:

- Enhance integration and collaboration between Temple University Public Safety and PPD
- Improve hot spot identification and management
- Strengthen real-time communication and information-sharing
- Increase visibility and presence in key areas

Importantly, this additional PPD deployment comes at no cost to Temple University. Additionally, last month, Temple Public Safety and Philadelphia Police Department leadership came together to collaborate and strengthen partnerships that keep the Temple and North Philadelphia communities safer (below). Taking advantage of the quieter campus environment, TUDPS delivered immersive training scenarios designed to build upon officers' existing skills and experience. These sessions included active assailant response, room-clearing drills, and emergency tactics, while reinforcing de-escalation strategies and crisis intervention principles. The training ensured officers are prepared to respond effectively while maintaining empathy, professionalism, and restraint in complex situations. Sincere appreciation is extended to the dedicated planners, instructors, and role players who invested months of effort to develop and deliver this training. Their commitment ensured the curriculum was realistic, challenging, and fully aligned with broader university safety protocols. This collaborative work reflects a shared dedication to the safety and well-being of the Temple community.
