Chief's Corner

Temple University's Office of Emergency Management (OEM) hosted a comprehensive tabletop exercise this month focused on emergency response coordination. "As we brought together senior leaders from across the university, our goal was to strengthen campus-wide readiness in the face of critical incidents," said Len Clark, director of OEM. The scenario-driven tabletop simulated an emergency involving a measles outbreak and required collaboration between public safety, administration, student/employee health, strategic communications, facilities, the Office of Compliance, the Provost's Office, Temple Health and other university and city departments. "This exercise emphasized roles, decision-making, communication and resource deployment during a crisis," said Joshua Nussbaum, deputy director of OEM. There is no doubt about it: This kind of proactive planning is essential. In any emergency, every second counts. Every department has a role to play. These exercises help us stay ready, stay coordinated and protect our community. Director Clark concluded the presentation saying that the university can apply lessons learned from the tabletop to many other situations. -Jennifer Griffin.
