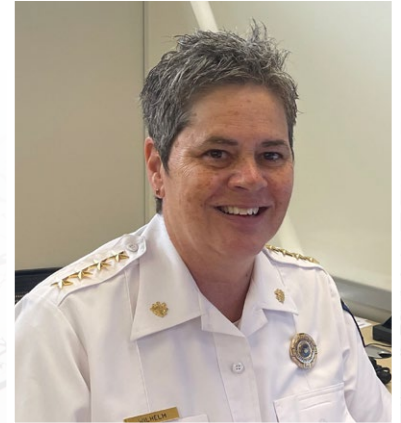
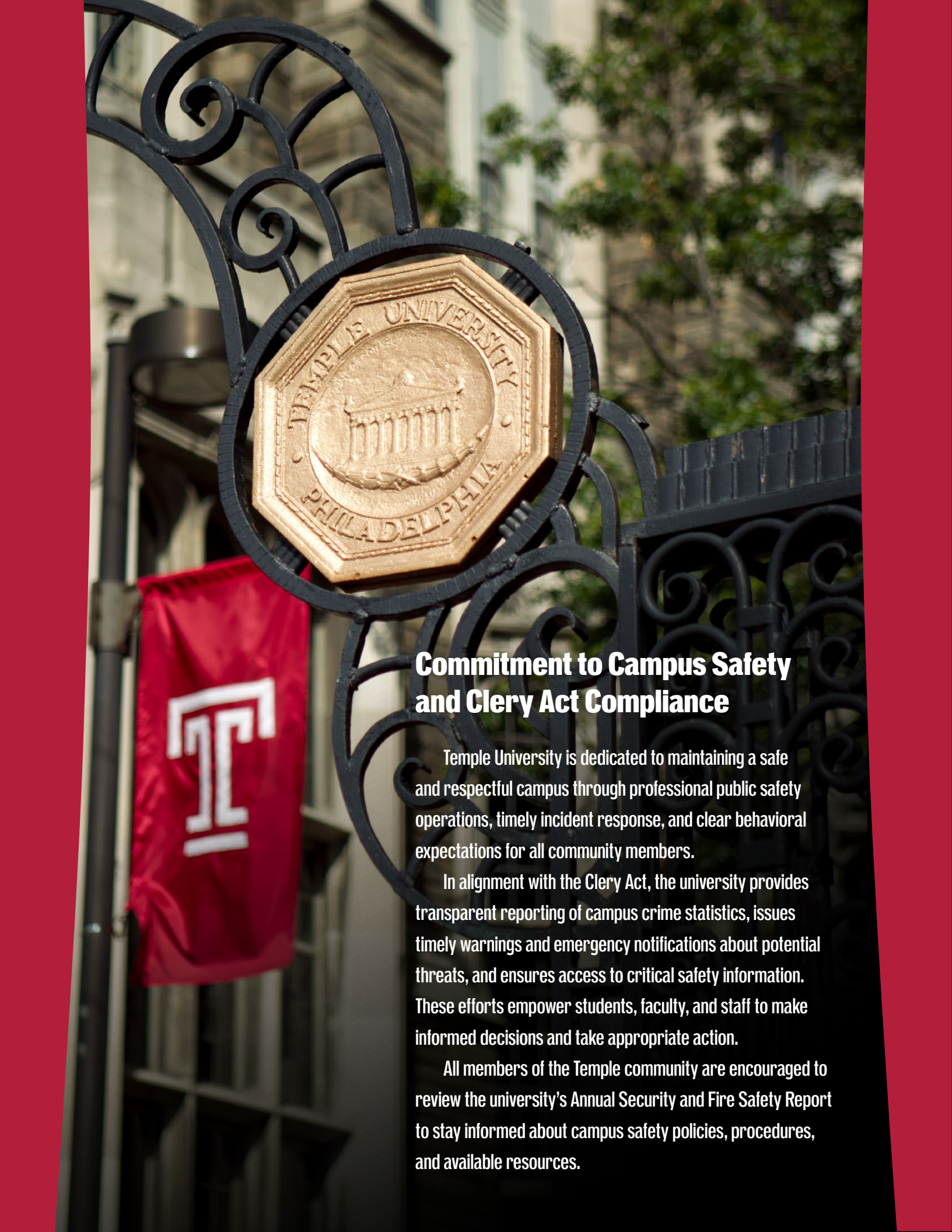

Commitment to Campus Safety and Clery Act Compliance

Temple University is dedicated to maintaining a safe and respectful campus through professional public safety operations, timely incident response, and clear behavioral expectations for all community members.

In alignment with the Clery Act, the university provides transparent reporting of campus crime statistics, issues timely warnings and emergency notifications about potential threats, and ensures access to critical safety information. These efforts empower students, faculty, and staff to make informed decisions and take appropriate action.

All members of the Temple community are encouraged to review the university's Annual Security and Fire Safety Report to stay informed about campus safety policies, procedures, and available resources.



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Purpose and Overview

Temple University is a vibrant public research institution where opportunities, learning, and communities create an exceptional student experience. As a comprehensive, internationally recognized university, Temple fosters intellectual curiosity, creativity, and leadership among more than 21,200 undergraduates and more than 8,200 graduate students. With nine campuses across Pennsylvania and around the world, Temple is recognized for its academic excellence, innovative research, and global reach. Through a wide range of programs, activities, initiatives, and support services, students have opportunities to pursue their academic goals, explore personal interests, develop leadership skills, and prepare for successful careers. Together, these experiences create a welcoming and supportive environment where every student can find a sense of belonging, realize their full potential, and make the most of their university journey.

Clery Report and Campus Safety

This publication is prepared in collaboration with multiple departments, including the Department of Public Safety, the Office of University Housing and Residential Life, the Office of the Fire Marshal, the Division of Student Affairs, the Office of Facilities Management, the Office of University Counsel, the Title IX Office, the Institutional Research and Assessment division and local law enforcement agencies. It is developed in accordance with the Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act (the “Clery Act”) and reflects Temple University’s commitment to transparency in campus safety, crime reporting, victim support, and hazing prevention, as required by federal law. The report also incorporates applicable requirements of the Stop Campus Hazing Act.

Under the Clery Act, colleges and universities that participate in federal student financial aid programs are required to:

- Collect, classify, and disclose crime statistics for Clery-reportable offenses occurring within Clery Act geography.
- Publish an Annual Security Report (ASR) containing campus crime statistics for the previous three calendar years, as well as campus safety, security, crime prevention, victim assistance, and disciplinary policies and procedures.
- Issue timely warnings for Clery-reportable crimes that pose a serious or continuing threat to the campus community.
- Issue emergency notifications upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees.
- Maintain and make available a daily crime log of reported criminal incidents.
- Disclose policies, procedures, and prevention/awareness programs related to sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking, including victims’ rights and institutional response procedures.

- Provide annual fire safety information and fire statistics for on-campus student housing facilities, maintain a fire log, and publish an Annual Fire Safety Report where required.
- Disclose missing student notification procedures for students residing in on-campus housing.
- Submit annual crime and fire statistics to the U.S. Department of Education.
- Comply with hazing prevention and transparency requirements, including the collection and disclosure of hazing statistics and the publication of required hazing transparency information in accordance with the Stop Campus Hazing Act.

Each member of the Temple community receives an electronic notification via email with a direct web link to this report. The report is also accessible through the Department of Public Safety’s website. Additionally, prospective students and employees are directed to the Annual Safety and Annual Fire Safety Report, and printed copies are available upon request by calling **(215) 204-7900** or emailing police@temple.edu.

Crime Reporting and Records Management

All crimes, emergencies, and serious incidents reported to Temple Police are promptly responded to and documented by police officers, detectives, or security officers, as appropriate. Telephone calls made to Temple Police at **(215) 204-1234** are electronically recorded to ensure that each reported crime or incident is documented.

Dispatchers serve as the initial point of contact for calls and begin documenting incident information in the Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) system. Security officers and police officers may respond to incidents based on the nature of the call. When a police report is required, a police officer is dispatched to investigate and complete the report.

Police officers and detectives record detailed information regarding crimes and incidents in the Department's Records Management System (RMS). Reports are entered into the RMS using Mobile Data Computers (MDCs) in patrol vehicles or other mobile devices. The RMS is used throughout the Department of Public Safety to ensure accurate and comprehensive recordkeeping.

As appropriate, crimes are documented in a Philadelphia Police Department (PPD) report and transmitted to additional law enforcement agencies, if necessary.

On a monthly basis, Temple Police reports crime statistics to the Pennsylvania State Police.

Accessing the Daily Crime Log

The Temple community has access to a daily crime log, which is available on the Public Safety website (safety.temple.edu). The most recent 60-day period of reported incidents is available for public review at Temple Police Headquarters. Records older than 60 days can be requested and will be made available within two business days for public inspection.

Public Safety Overview

Public Safety Operations and Locations

The Department of Public Safety provides 24/7 service to the Temple community, ensuring security year-round. The department oversees safety operations for more than 130 buildings across approximately 390 acres, managing locations at the Main Campus, Health Sciences Center, and Ambler Campus. These sites operate as resource centers where individuals can interact with personnel, obtain information, and learn about departmental programs and services.

Temple University Department of Public Safety Team

The Department of Public Safety is comprised of dedicated police officers, security officers, dispatchers, and administrators, all working together to protect and support the Temple community. Each Temple Police officer is a Pennsylvania-certified law enforcement professional, having completed state-mandated training at an accredited academy. With full authority to enforce laws and make arrests, they operate with the same legal powers as municipal police officers, ensuring a safe and secure campus environment.

Police Operations and Responsibilities

Temple police officers play a vital role in maintaining public safety and ensuring a secure environment for students, faculty, and staff. Their responsibilities typically include:

- **Emergency Response** – Quickly addressing incidents, medical emergencies, and threats to campus security.
- **Crime Prevention and Investigation** – Conducting patrols, investigating crimes, and working to deter unlawful activity.
- **Community Engagement** – Building relationships with the campus community through outreach, education, and safety programs.
- **Traffic and Parking Enforcement** – Regulating vehicle movement, enforcing traffic laws, and issuing citations for illegally parked vehicles.
- **Event Security** – Providing safety oversight for campus events, ensuring orderly conduct and crowd management.
- **Policy and Law Enforcement** – Upholding university policies and local laws while ensuring compliance across campus.
- **Safety Education and Awareness** – Conducting workshops on crime prevention, emergency preparedness, and personal safety.
- **Collaboration with Local Authorities** – Coordinating with municipal police and emergency responders for broader safety efforts.

Officers foster positive relationships with the Temple community in their assigned sectors. They are highly visible, wearing distinctive uniforms, and are readily available to assist in any situation.

Police Training and Certification

Temple Police officers undergo **annual state-mandated in-service training** in accordance with the **Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission (MPOETC)**, which covers:

- Updates to the Pennsylvania Crimes Code, Vehicle Code, and Rules of Criminal Procedure
- Crisis Intervention
- Trauma Informed Policing
- Responding to Allegations of Child Abuse

Additionally, officers receive supplemental training in critical areas such as:

- Mental health crisis response and those with disabilities
- First Aid/C.P.R., use of Automated External Defibrillator
- Naloxone (Narcan) administration
- Active assailant/armed intruder response
- De-escalation techniques
- The Timothy J. Piazza Anti-Hazing Law and the Stop Campus Hazing Act

Emergency Dispatcher Operations and Responsibilities

Temple University's emergency dispatchers serve as the nerve center of campus safety, operating within a technologically advanced Communications Center. Certified by The Association of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO) International, a leading organization for public safety communication professionals, Temple's emergency dispatchers are trained to manage complex, real-time systems, answer incoming emergency calls, and deploy personnel with speed and precision. The department's communication center is connected directly to the Philadelphia Police Communication Center, enabling seamless coordination and real-time monitoring of nearby law enforcement activities. In July 2024, the Communications Center was further enhanced with the Automated Records Management System (ARMS), a Clery-compliant platform that streamlines incident reporting, personnel coordination, and record management. Dispatchers use multi-monitor workstations, advanced radio communications, and surveillance technologies to maintain continuous situational awareness and support informed, efficient responses.

Operating 24/7, Temple's emergency dispatchers provide seamless coordination and ensure the continuity of campus safety operations. They monitor campus-wide alerts and emergency notifications, coordinate multi-agency responses during critical incidents, and maintain detailed records of all calls and response actions. Their ability to synthesize information quickly and communicate clearly under pressure is essential to

effective crisis management. By combining technical expertise with calm decision-making, Temple's dispatchers play a pivotal role in fostering a safe, responsive, and well-coordinated campus environment.

Security Operations and Responsibilities

In addition to police services, the Department of Public Safety manages a Security Division, which includes Temple security officers and full-time and part-time security officers from Allied Universal Security Services, a contracted security provider. Allied Universal officers are assigned to campus buildings and residence halls to maintain security.

Security officers receive annual training on:

- Residence hall access protocols (electronic sign-in, card readers, guest policy enforcement)
- Screening intoxicated individuals (with police and/or medical personnel)
- Emergency response procedures, including evacuations

Additionally, security personnel complete training focused on Clery Act compliance, equipping them with the tools necessary to perform their roles effectively.

Monitoring Criminal Activity at Off-Campus Locations

Temple Police collaborates with local law enforcement when off-campus criminal activity impacts the Temple community. Officers may assist agencies such as the Philadelphia Police Department, which routinely works with Temple Police on serious incidents occurring in the immediate neighborhood and areas surrounding Temple's patrol zones.

Temple University does not operate any off-campus housing or off-campus student organization facilities at its Main Campus.

Relationship with Local Law Enforcement

The Department of Public Safety maintains a strong collaborative network with law enforcement agencies, including the Philadelphia Police Department, Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) Police Department, Pennsylvania State Police, Upper Dublin Police Department (Ambler Campus), and other relevant agencies. Temple Police maintains a memorandum of understanding with the Philadelphia Police Department to ensure coordinated safety services.

Reporting Criminal Activity or Emergencies on Campus

How to Report an Emergency

Temple students, faculty, staff, and visitors are encouraged to promptly and accurately report all criminal activity and emergencies occurring on campus to Temple Police or local law enforcement.

Crimes and incidents at the following campuses may be reported to Temple Police:

- Main Campus, Health Sciences Center, Center City, Podiatry, Ambler, and Fort Washington
 - From a campus phone: **Dial 1-1234**
 - From a non-campus phone: **Call (215) 204-1234**
- For incidents occurring off-campus or at other U.S. campuses, contact local law enforcement at 9-1-1.

Code Blue Emergency Phone Systems

Temple University's Main Campus, Health Sciences Center, and Ambler Campus are equipped with more than 90 Code Blue Emergency Phones, strategically placed throughout each location for quick access in case of emergency.

- In an emergency, press the red button to activate the system.
- The phone will trigger bright blue strobe flashes and connect directly to Temple Police.

First Responders

Designated first responders vary by campus:

- **Main and Health Sciences Center**
 - Temple Police officers, security personnel, fire marshals, and Temple University Emergency Medical Services (TUEMS)
- **Ambler campus**
 - Upper Dublin Police Department (9-1-1)
- **Podiatry and Center City campuses**
 - City of Philadelphia Police and Fire Departments



Code Blue emergency phones are strategically placed throughout the campus for a quick connection to Public Safety.

- **Fort Washington, Harrisburg, and off-campus locations**

- Local law enforcement (9-1-1)

- **Temple University Japan**

- **Temple University Rome**

- Pan-EU number: Dial 1-1-2
- Ambulance: Dial 1-1-8

- Fire: Dial 1-1-5

Crime Reporting and Documentation

Regardless of campus location, all crimes, emergencies and serious incidents that are reported to Temple Police are:

- Promptly addressed and documented by a Temple Police Officer, Detective, or Security Officer
- Electronically recorded for accuracy
- Entered into the Records Management System (RMS) using Mobile Data Computers (MDCs)

Temple Police reports crime statistics to the Pennsylvania State Police monthly. In appropriate cases, incidents may also be documented in a Philadelphia Police report and forwarded to the relevant PPD police district.

Confidential Reporting of Criminal Offenses

If you are the victim of or witness a criminal offense and wish to document the incident without triggering an investigation or disciplinary process, you may file a confidential report with Temple Police.

Confidential reports allow the university to:

- Maintain accurate records of incidents involving students
- Identify crime patterns in particular areas
- Alert the campus community to potential dangers
- Take necessary precautions for campus safety

Temple University strives to honor confidentiality; however, in certain circumstances, action may be required to protect you or the broader community. The university strictly prohibits retaliation against those who file good-faith reports.

How to Submit a Confidential Report

You may report a concern confidentially and voluntarily through the following channels:

- **Phone:** Call **215-204-6493** (available 24 hours for non-emergency tips)

- **Email:** You may email police@temple.edu; however, please note that email is **not a guaranteed confidential channel** and may be subject to follow-up or disclosure under applicable laws.

Please note: These channels are intended for sharing information and may be used anonymously. They are **not monitored 24/7** and may not result in follow-up contact. They are **not intended to file an official police report or request immediate assistance**. Reports submitted through these methods may be included in Temple University's annual crime statistics as required by the Clery Act.

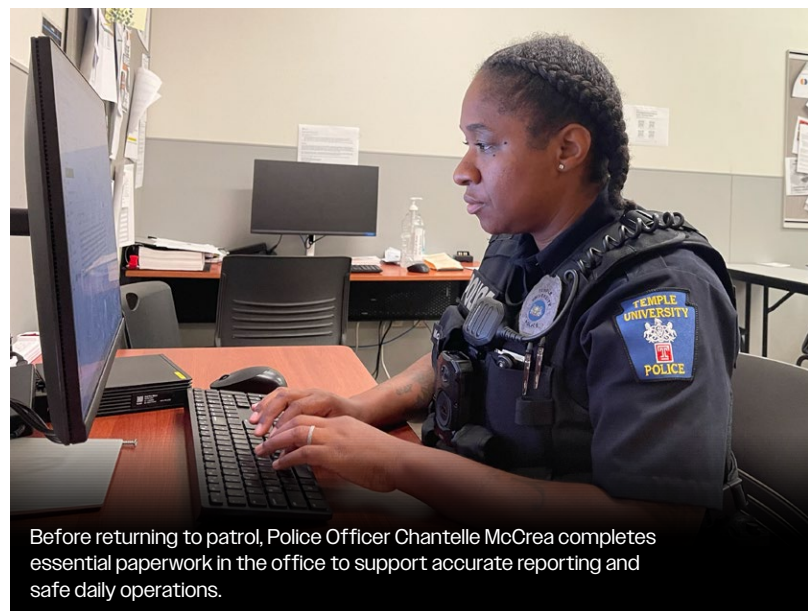

Confidential Reporting: Sexual Misconduct

Sexual misconduct includes sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment.¹ If you are the victim of sexual misconduct, confidential reporting resources enable you to receive support while ensuring Temple complies with federal laws like Title IX and the Clery Act.

Confidential Support Resources

The University offers confidential support resources for students and employees who have experienced sexual misconduct. These services provide support, counseling, information, and referrals while maintaining confidentiality. Confidential resources do not automatically report incidents to law enforcement or other authorities. However, they can help individuals understand available reporting options and provide assistance if an individual chooses to make a report.

Campus Security Authority (CSA)

A Campus Security Authority (CSA) is an individual or organization affiliated with Temple University who holds significant responsibility for student and campus activities. CSAs play a crucial role in ensuring compliance with the Clery Act by reporting criminal activity to Temple Police and by supporting campus safety initiatives.

Designated CSA Roles and Responsibilities

At Temple University, individuals who meet the criteria for being a CSA include, but are not limited to:

- **Student Affairs Leadership:** Dean of Students or Vice President overseeing student housing, student centers, or extracurricular activities
- **Athletics Staff:** Director of Athletics, team coaches, and other designated personnel
- **Student Organization Advisors:** Faculty advisors to student groups
- **Residential Life Staff:** Including student Resident Assistants (RAs)
- **Greek Life Leadership:** Coordinator of Greek Life
- **Title IX Officials:** Title IX Coordinator and related personnel
- **Campus Support Roles:** Ombudsperson, director of a campus health or counseling center (in an administrative capacity)
- **Public Safety Personnel:** Temple Police officers and campus security personnel

Mandatory Reporting Guidelines for CSAs

A crime is considered reported when a victim, witness, third party, or offender shares information with a CSA or local law enforcement personnel. CSAs are required to report all received crime-related information to Temple Police.

- **Responsibility to Report:** The association of individuals involved with the university does not affect the obligation to report.
- **Good Faith Reporting:** If a CSA receives information and believes it was provided in good faith (i.e., there is a reasonable basis to believe the report is not merely rumor or hearsay), they must report it to Temple Police.
- **Required Report Details:**
 - Date and location of the incident
 - Personally identifiable information, including the victim's name and contact information, when appropriate and with the victim's consent.

CSAs ensure accurate crime statistics are disclosed annually and may provide information that is useful in determining whether it is appropriate for the university to issue timely warnings or emergency notifications for incidents posing a serious or ongoing threat to the campus community.

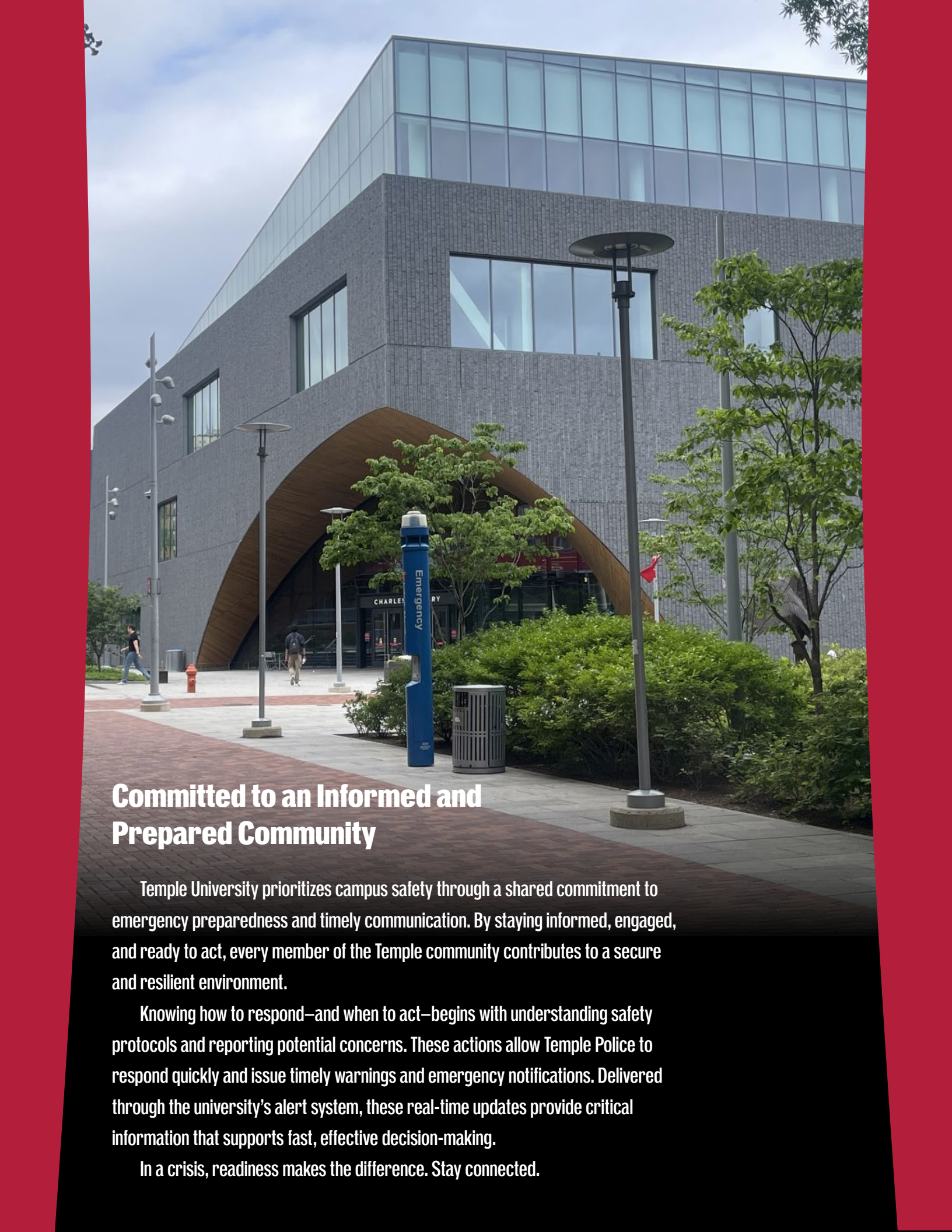
Roles Not Classified as CSAs

While certain individuals hold significant responsibilities for student and campus activities, they are **not classified as CSAs** under the Clery Act. These exceptions include:

- **Pastoral Counselors:**
 - Individuals associated with a religious order or denomination
 - Recognized by that order as providers of confidential counseling
 - Functioning within the scope of their religious recognition
- **Professional Counselors:**
 - Those whose official role includes providing mental health counseling to members of the university community
 - Functioning within the scope of their license or certification
 - Includes both Temple University employees and contracted counselors

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Campus Safety Alerts

Timely Warnings

In compliance with the Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act (Clery Act), Temple University, in a manner that is timely and will aid in the prevention of similar crimes, will report to the campus community certain crimes occurring in designated reporting areas that pose a serious or continuing threat the campus community.

Reporting Areas

Timely warnings will be issued for Clery-reportable crimes occurring in the following geographic areas:

- On campus
- Public property within or immediately adjacent to campus
- Non-campus buildings or property owned or controlled by Temple University

Criteria for Issuance

Timely warnings will be issued for certain crimes reported to Temple Police or local police agencies that are considered by university officials to represent a serious or continuing threat to students and employees so that they can take protective measures.

Additional information may be provided as it becomes available.

Confidentiality

Timely warnings will keep the identity of victims confidential to the fullest extent possible when issuing timely warnings.

Methods of Communication

Mass notification systems are a cornerstone of campus safety at Temple University and play a critical role in meeting Clery Act requirements for timely warnings and emergency notification. The following methods may be used to communicate with students, faculty, and staff through one or more of the following methods:

- Email to university accounts
- Physical postings in campus buildings
- Other electronic means, including website updates or social media.

Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to regularly check their university email and ensure their mobile phone numbers are updated in [TUportal](#) under Personal Information (“Mobile – Personal” and/or “Mobile – Work”).

Emergency Notifications

Temple University is committed to providing accurate and timely information to the campus community during emergencies. The university’s ***Emergency Communication Policy (Policy No. 04.61.01)*** outlines the approval process, criteria, and methods for communicating with students, faculty, and staff during emergencies at any university location.

In the event of an immediate threat to health or safety occurring on campus, Temple will issue an emergency notification.

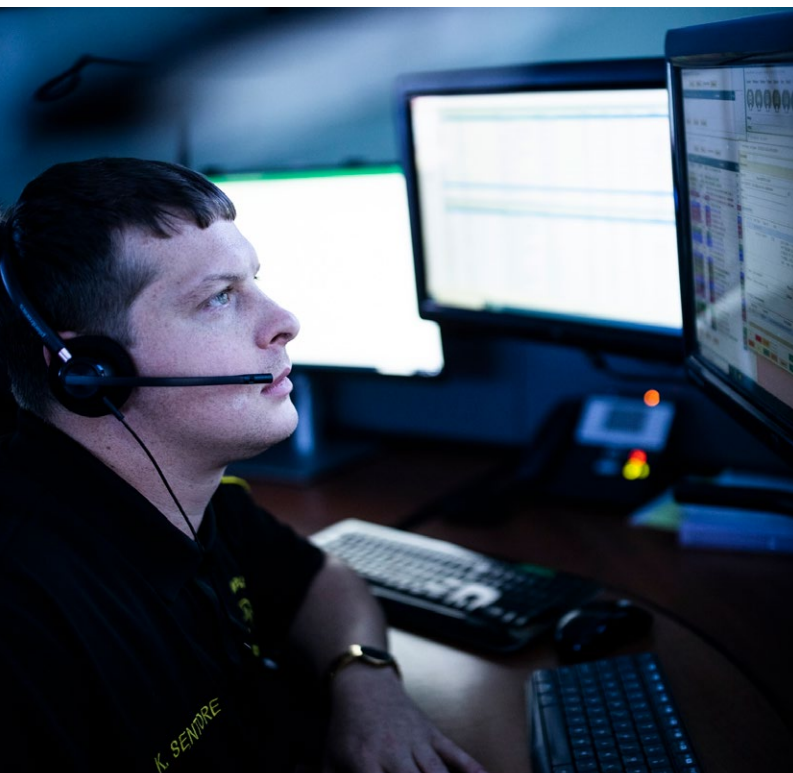
Procedures to Notify the Campus Community

Upon confirmation by Temple University Police or other authorized personnel of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees on campus, Temple University will initiate emergency notification procedures without delay. Notification may only be delayed if, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, issuing the alert would compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or mitigate the emergency.

The President, the Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, the Vice President of Public Safety, or their designees will determine the type and content of the notification and identify the appropriate segment or segments of the campus community to receive it. These individuals will also initiate the university’s notification system, taking into account the safety of the community.

Temple University uses multiple systems to notify students, faculty, and staff of emergencies that pose an immediate threat to health or safety. These procedures comply with the Jeanne Clery Act.

Dispatcher Kyle Sentore plays a key role in TUPD operations, monitoring activity and maintaining constant communication with the Public Safety team.





Notification Systems

- **TUalert:** Sent via email, text, and/or phone call to registered users. Used for incidents on or near campus requiring immediate action.
- **TUfire:** Activated only in catastrophic, life-threatening situations (e.g., severe weather, hazardous material release, active assailant). Signals the need to shelter-in-place or lockdown.

Emergency Notification Process

- Notifications are issued without delay once an emergency is confirmed.
- Authorized officials include the President, the Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, or the Vice President of Public Safety and/or their designees.
- Alerts may be targeted to specific campus areas depending on the nature of the threat.

Messages about criminal activity typically do not trigger an emergency notification unless university officials determine that the incident presents an immediate or ongoing threat to the health or safety of students or employees.

In certain circumstances however, when university officials deem it appropriate, a communication may be sent regarding activity in around campus that does not involve an immediate threat but is considered important for campus awareness and safety.

Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to review emergency preparedness resources. More information regarding Temple University's emergency response and evacuation procedures, and directions on how to register for TUalert, can be found online:

Dissemination of Emergency Information

Temple University is committed to keeping both the campus and surrounding community informed during significant emergencies or dangerous situations involving an immediate threat to health or safety.

Public Communication Channels

To reach the broader public, Temple University may use the following methods:

- **University Home Page**

The Temple University website (www.temple.edu) may be updated with emergency-related information, including:

- Details about the nature of the emergency
- Instructions or protective actions for the public
- Status updates and "all clear" messages when appropriate

- **Emergency Hotline**

A dedicated emergency telephone number may be activated to provide recorded updates. This hotline will offer:

- Situation summaries
- Safety instructions
- Notifications when the emergency has been resolved.

Post-Emergency Updates

Once the threat has passed, Temple University will:

- Issue a message indicating that normal operations may resume.
- Update both the university home page and emergency hotline with final information.

These communication tools ensure that timely and accurate information is available to the campus community and the public throughout the duration of an emergency.

General Evacuation Procedure

An evacuation is implemented when conditions are no longer safe for students, faculty, and staff to remain in a building or a specific area in a building. This requires occupants to move out and away from a building to a designated rally point or out and away from a specific area within a building. It is most commonly used when there is a suspected fire or related emergency condition in a building.

In the event that you must evacuate, you should:

1. **Leave immediately when the fire alarm sounds.** Close all doors behind you, proceed to the fire exit, and leave the building. If you are in Morgan North or South, the alarm will announce where evacuation should occur (the floor of the alarm and the floors above and below the alarm). The remaining floors should await notification and instructions from the Philadelphia Fire Department Incident Commander, Temple University Fire Marshal or other university personnel regarding evacuation.

2. **Do not use elevators.** Use the stairs. Elevators will stop if power fails, causing occupants to become trapped. Elevator shafts are like chimneys. Smoke could enter the elevator and shaft thereby asphyxiating the occupants trying to evacuate the building.
3. **If the door is hot** or smoke is seeping in, **do not open it.** Feel the door that leads from your room to the corridor for heat before opening it. If you become trapped in your room and cannot reach the fire exit, keep the door closed and seal off any cracks. Call the Fire Department (9-1-1) or Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, and give your specific location, including the floor and room number.
4. **Stay low** if caught in smoke or heat. **Take short breaths** (through your nose) until you reach an *Area of Refuge*.
5. **If the door feels cool, open cautiously.** Be prepared to slam it shut if the corridor is full of smoke or if you feel heat pressure against the door. If the corridor is clear, proceed with the escape plan.
6. **Keep moving** for at least 200 feet and proceed to the designated rally point after leaving the building. Do not reenter until given permission by Temple Police or the Fire Department.

7. **People with Mobility Limitations:** If your floor has to be evacuated, you should plan to relocate to an *Area of Refuge* or an exit stair landing. If possible, **call Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, or the Fire Department (9-1-1).** Identify your location and floor. Be sure to indicate if you require special equipment to descend the stairs. The Fire Department should arrive quickly, though it may take time to assist you. As part of your personal preparedness, please think about and develop a plan to address your needs in advance of any emergency.

If you become trapped and cannot reach the fire exit, keep the door closed and seal off any cracks. **Contact appropriate authorities and give the location of your building, the floor you are on and a contact number:**

- if appropriate, **call the Temple Police at (215) 204-1234 or the local police and fire departments by calling 9-1-1;**
- **in Rome, call the fire department at 1-1-5;**
- **in Japan, call the fire department at 1-1-9**

Keep all fire exit and corridor doors closed at all times.

These doors are fire rated to keep smoke and heat from entering stairways and adjoining corridors. If at any time you observe these doors propped or tied open, please close them and report the location to the Assistant Fire Marshal Stephen Bickel. (215) 204-7938 or call Temple Police (215) 204-1234.

Area of Refuge: If your floor has to be evacuated, relocate to a protected area, such as oversized landings in fire-safe stairwells or stand-alone, barriered compartments on the floor. Next, call Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, or the Fire Department (9-1-1) and provide your location. Wait in the protected space until fire department personnel can remove you.

Personal Preparedness: Plan in advance to have a responsible person assist you in the event of fire. Use a “buddy” system to help you get to a protected area. Anticipate situations where the “buddy” may not be available in an emergency.

Fire towers are enclosed stairways that have fire-rated doors and walls that provide a refuge from smoke and heat in a fire emergency. Doors leading into fire towers are inspected periodically to ensure that they open and close properly and should never be tied or propped open. Fire towers cannot be used for storage or as smoking areas. Fire towers are to be clean, well-lit, and free of obstructions at all times. Fire towers are an *Area of Refuge*.

Shelter-in-Place Procedure

Shelter-in-place is used when it is **safer to stay indoors** than evacuate, such as during a hazardous materials release or severe weather event.

If Shelter-in-Place is Activated:

1. **Stay inside** your building, or immediately go into the nearest building.
2. **Move to interior rooms with no windows** or with windows that can be closed. Rooms that have little or no outside ventilation are preferred.
3. **Close any open windows and doors.**
4. **Await further instruction.** Be prepared to quickly follow directions from responders or from TUalert.
5. **Do not evacuate** the building until an “All Clear” is given by emergency personnel or by TUalert.

Standing tall at the heart of campus, the Bell Tower reflects the strength of our community.

Lockdown Procedure

A **lockdown** is initiated when there is an **immediate threat** on campus. It requires restricting access to **all or portions** of university buildings.

If you are **INSIDE A building on campus AND an incident IS OCCURRING ELSEWHERE:**

1. Lock exterior doors *only* if the threat is **OUTSIDE** the building and it is safe to reach the doors.
2. Call Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, or 9-1-1 as soon as you are able and only if you have information to provide.
3. Notify other building occupants of “Campus Lockdown” status if possible.
4. Close, lock and barricade interior doors, if possible.
5. **HIDE** in your room or office.
6. **REMAIN QUIET.**
7. **WAIT** until emergency personnel communicates an “All Clear.”

If you are **INSIDE a building on campus where an incident IS occurring:**

1. Lock exterior doors *only* if the threat is **OUTSIDE** the building and it is safe to reach the doors.
2. Call Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, or 9-1-1 as soon as you are able. Provide as much information as possible to the police.
3. **RUN:** If you can get out, **LEAVE IMMEDIATELY** and seek safe refuge elsewhere.
4. **HIDE:** If you cannot get out, **SECURE YOURSELF.** Hide behind locked doors, away from windows, and be silent and still.
5. Close, lock and barricade interior doors, if possible.
6. **REMAIN QUIET.**
7. **FIGHT:** As a Last Resort, and only if your life is in danger, be prepared to defend yourself.
8. **WAIT** until you are given the “All Clear.”

If you are **OUTSIDE a building where an incident is occurring:**

1. Do not enter the building.
2. Go far away from the building(s) under lockdown.
3. Find a safe location and stay there.
4. **DO NOT LEAVE YOUR SAFE AREA** until the Police release you from your area.
5. Await emergency notification in the form of a TUalert. Check the University’s website and social media sites for updates and further information as it becomes available.
6. Do not call the location on Lockdown as you may endanger lives.
7. Call Temple Police, (215) 204-1234, or 9-1-1 if you have relevant information.

Testing of Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

Temple University conducts annual testing of its emergency response and evacuation procedures to ensure preparedness and compliance with the Clery Act.

Purpose of Testing

These tests are designed to:

- Familiarize students and employees with emergency exits and evacuation routes.
- Reinforce knowledge of designated rally points outside campus buildings.
- Evaluate the effectiveness of emergency procedures and communication systems.

Frequency and Format

- At least one test per calendar year is conducted.
- Tests may be announced or unannounced.
- Each test is coordinated by the Office of the Fire Marshal and the Office of Emergency Management

Publicizing Procedures

In conjunction with at least one annual test, Temple University will:

- Publicize its emergency response and evacuation procedures to the campus community.
- Provide instructions and guidance on how to respond during various emergency scenarios.

Documentation Requirements

For each test, Temple University will maintain records that include:

- A description of the exercise
- The date and time of the test
- Whether the test was announced or unannounced

No alerts, no worries. Just students out and about, heading to class and enjoying campus life.



Commitment to Safe, Supportive Learning and Living Environments

Temple University is committed to providing secure welcoming spaces, whether in the classroom, residence halls, or social settings—where students can learn, live, and grow with confidence.

Safety is central to how we design our campus and campus life. We encourage everyone to make situational awareness part of their everyday routine, from how they interact with others to how they care for themselves and their community. Through collaboration among Public Safety, Housing and Residential Life, academic departments, and students, we foster an environment where community values are actively upheld, and trust is built through open communication and shared responsibility.

From secure facilities and responsive staff to inclusive programming and a clear commitment to conduct standards, every element of our approach is designed to support academic success, personal development, and a lasting sense of belonging.





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Access to Campus Facilities

Campus Access

Temple University has more than 120 buildings, and access to open facilities, events, and programs is granted to all students and employees with a valid Temple identification card.

- Students and employees must carry their mobile identification at all times.
- Upon request, individuals must present their OWLcard identification to a university official.
- Visitors may receive access for specific activities by providing photo identification.

Strategic Campus Patrols and Community Presence

Temple University maintains a strong security presence across its campuses, ensuring safety and fostering connections with the community.

- Temple Police officers and security personnel are highly visible on the Main, Health Sciences Center, Center City, Podiatry, Fort Washington, and Ambler campuses.
- Officers on Main and Health Sciences Center campuses patrol 24/7, linked through a state-of-the-art communication center.

Patrol Boundaries

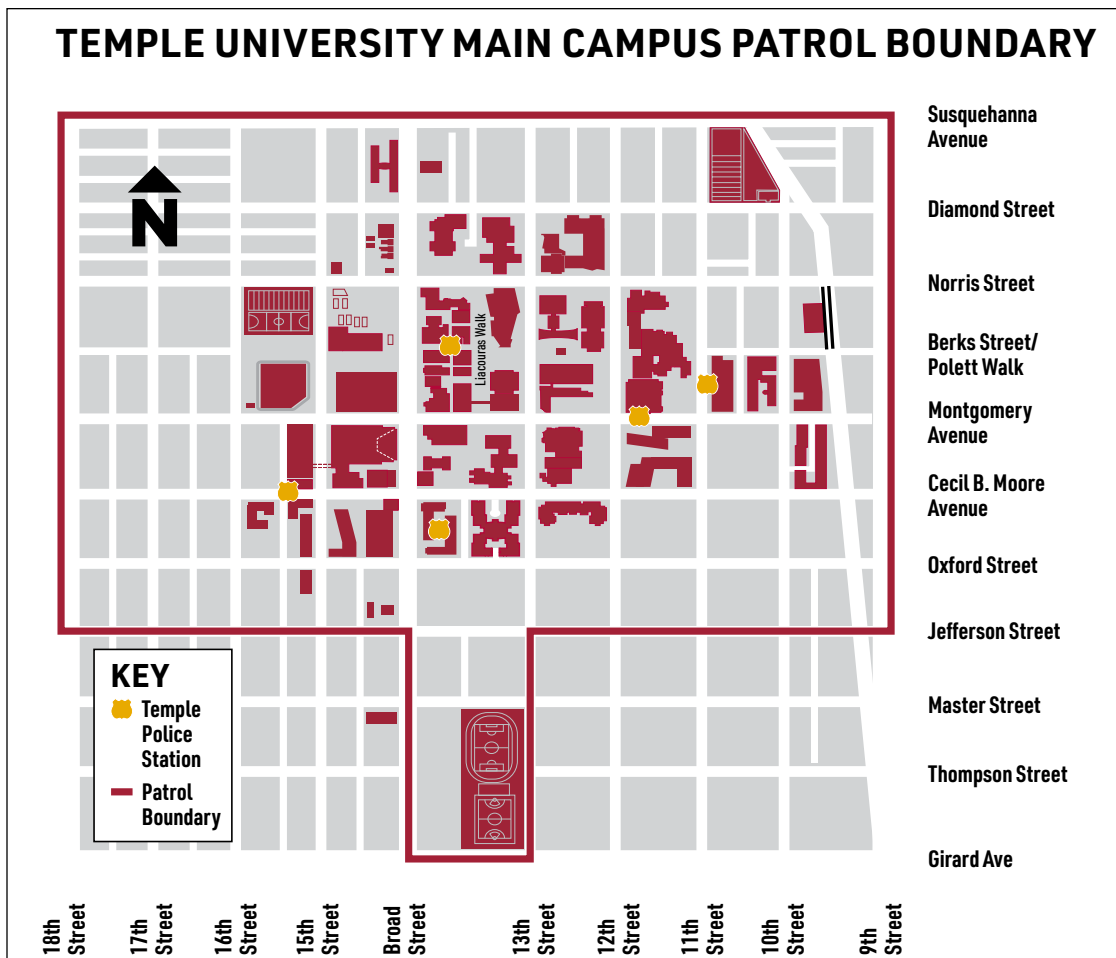
Main Campus

- Northern boundary: Susquehanna Avenue
- Southern boundary: Jefferson Street (except from 13th to Broad Street, where the boundary extends to Girard Avenue)
- Western boundary: 18th Street
- Eastern boundary: 9th Street

Health Sciences Center Campus

- Northern boundary: Venango Street, extending from 15th Street to Germantown Avenue
- Southern boundary: Allegheny Avenue, stretching from 15th Street to Park Avenue



- Western boundary: Venango Street to Allegheny Avenue
- Eastern boundary: Germantown Avenue, Rising Sun Avenue, 13th Street, and Park Avenue

Ambler Campus

- Patrol coverage includes Meetinghouse Road (southwest side) and Loop Drive around the outer campus perimeter.
- Security personnel also monitor Meetinghouse Road from Butler Pike to Woods Drive.

Podiatry, Center City, and Fort Washington Campuses

- Security personnel actively monitor building interiors but do not conduct outdoor patrols.

Harrisburg Campus

- Security personnel, contracted through Securitas, monitor the interior of 234 Strawberry Street, Harrisburg, PA.

- Shrubbery and landscape maintenance ensure that outdoor spaces remain well-lit, minimizing safety risks.

Enhanced Communication and Technology (TUSafe App)

- Join the growing number of Temple community members who have downloaded the TUSafe app and are keeping essential safety tools and resources at their fingertips.
- Temple University's free personal safety app provides convenient access to Temple Police and 9-1-1, safe walk options, walking escorts, crime tip reporting, Flight shuttle information, campus maps, and more.

Shuttle Services and Safe Transportation

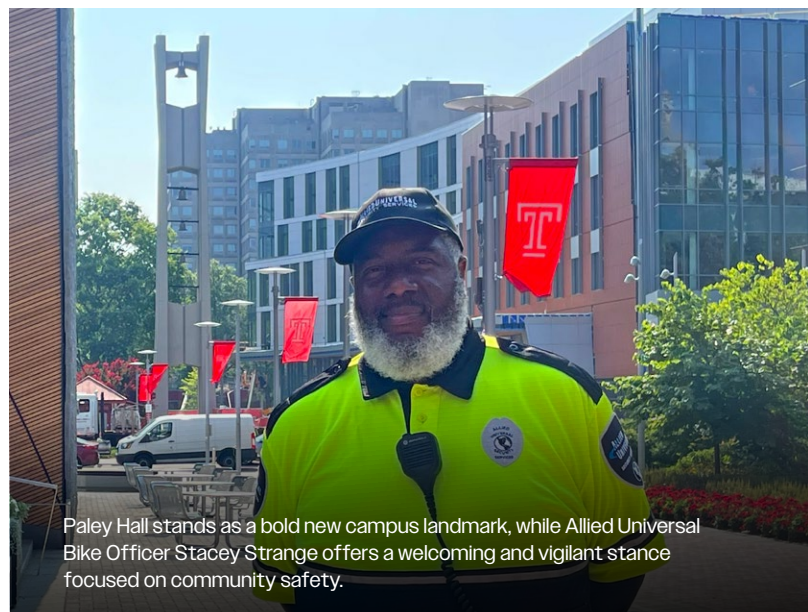
Bike and Scooter Registration and Theft Prevention

Public Safety staff and university administrators meet periodically throughout each semester with families and local community members to:

- Enhance communication and transparency.
- Collaborate on safety strategies for the campus and neighboring areas.

Parent Roundtables

Provides parents with direct access to university leadership, allowing them to share safety concerns and gain insights into campus security protocols.

Crime Prevention and Risk Reduction Programs

Temple University's Department of Public Safety is dedicated to promoting personal safety and minimizing crime risks through education, awareness initiatives, and proactive strategies. Various programs are available to support students, faculty, and staff in adopting crime prevention habits and making informed safety decisions.

Situational Awareness and Self-Defense Workshops

Offered each fall and spring semester, these free events teach:

- Situational awareness techniques for everyday and high-risk scenarios.
- Basic self-defense skills that enhance personal safety.
- Hands-on demonstrations and discussions on risk reduction strategies.
- Development of a defensive mindset to empower participants in managing personal safety.

These workshops are led by certified instructors and are designed to boost confidence and preparedness.

Educational Presentations and Awareness Campaigns

Class Presentations

Public Safety personnel offer specialized safety presentations on various crime prevention topics upon request.

Unattended Property Campaign

Public Safety representatives periodically tour campus buildings to:

- Monitor for unsecured or unattended personal items.
- Encourage students and staff to properly secure their belongings.

Bike and Scooter Safety Notices

Because bike and scooter theft are a nationwide issue, Public Safety:

- Provides preventive safety materials to educate the campus community.
- Encourages proper bike/scooter security practices.

Greeting visitors with an approachable, professional demeanor while maintaining standardized access protocols and consistent procedures is essential to residence safety. During security officer training, UHRL Associate Director Joshua McPhatter exemplifies these practices by preparing officers to uphold them when stationed in our residence halls.



Additional Safety Training Opportunities

Temple University offers accredited two-credit courses in informed decision-making strategies and personal defense through the Kinesiology Physical Activity Program (KPAP). These courses provide students with structured self-defense instruction to enhance safety and confidence.

Safety Policies for On-Campus Student Housing Facilities

University Housing and Residential Life (UHRL) at Temple University provides an intentional residential experience that promotes student success, personal development, and a safe campus community. In alignment with university standards and Clery Act requirements, UHRL applies comprehensive safety protocols across all housing operations. Residential spaces are purposefully designed to foster academic achievement, personal growth, campus safety, and community engagement. Through secure access controls, defined emergency procedures, and extensive staff training, UHRL prioritizes a safe and supportive environment for every student.

On-Campus Residences

- Temple University's University Housing and Residential Life (UHRL) offers three housing styles:
 - **Communal style:** Traditional residence halls with shared bathrooms and common areas
 - **Suite-style:** Private bedrooms with shared living spaces, ideal for small groups
 - **Apartment-style:** Independent units with private kitchens and bathrooms

- Residential spaces are flexible and inclusive, offering:
 - Individual apartments
 - Suites
 - Single-gender room options
- Temple University's residence halls can accommodate approximately 5,000 students.
- Currently, about 4,600 students reside in 9 residence hall buildings each year.
- More than 60 graduate students live in university housing at the Temple University School of Podiatric Medicine.
- Housing is assigned on a first-come, first-served basis
 - Priority is given to incoming freshmen and returning sophomores who complete the housing selection process.

Residential Security and Access Control

24/7 Security Monitoring

- Security officers are stationed in the lobby of each residence hall 24 hours a day to monitor building access and support resident safety.
- Residents must verify their identity by tapping their Temple University ID card or mobile OwlCard before entering their building.

Emergency Response and Incident Reporting

- All housing staff receive training in emergency response procedures, crisis communication, and documentation of safety-related incidents. Staff are directed to call Temple Police (215-204-1234) for emergencies and to report incidents.
- The UHRL team includes approximately 170 professional and student staff members who are equipped to respond quickly and accurately to safety concerns.

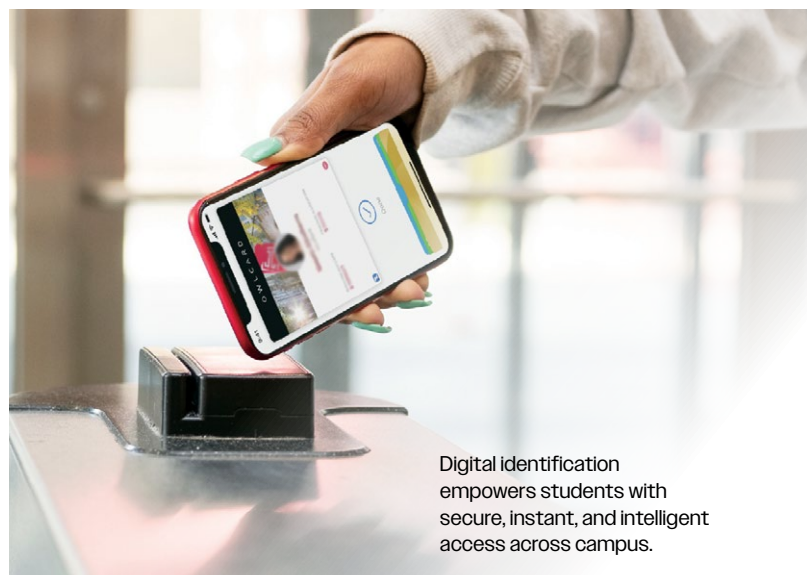
Guest Policy

General Guidelines

- A guest is any individual visiting a specific resident within a residence hall.
- Residents are responsible for registering guests and ensuring they follow all housing policies and applicable laws.
- Guests must be escorted by their host resident at all times.

Guest Registration and Entry

- Guest registration is managed through a digital system used by security and UHRL staff.
- Residents must register guests online prior to arrival.



Digital identification empowers students with secure, instant, and intelligent access across campus.

- Security officers will verify guest identity with a valid photo ID (e.g., driver's license, military ID, college ID, or OwlCard).
- Visitors not accompanied by a resident must wait outside until the host arrives and completes check-in at the security desk.
- Guests must be signed in/out electronically upon each entry and exit.

Guest Limits and Stay Duration

- Residents may host up to 3 guests at one time between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 a.m.
- Overnight guest limit: 1 guest per night.
- Guests may stay for up to 2 consecutive nights, and no more than 3 nights in a 7-day period.

Policy on Minor Guests

- Minors may only be signed in between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.
- No overnight stay is permitted for minors, in accordance with Temple University's Policy on Safety of Minors.

Guest Card Use and Expectations

- Residents must present and surrender their Guest Card during guest sign-in.
- Guest Cards are returned upon checkout of the final guest.
- Guest Card must be presented upon request by Residential Life or Security staff.
- Residents are accountable for Guest Card loss or misuse.
 - Replacement fee: \$20
 - Policy violations may lead to loss of guest privileges for a minimum of 2 weeks and/or further disciplinary action.

Room Change Procedures

Temple University offers a flexible room change process to accommodate student needs:

- Room changes may be accommodated at anytime during the year. There is typically a Room Change freeze at the start and end of each semester to ensure available space and availability and prepare for closing of the halls.
- Residents may seek a room change for a variety of reasons, including roommate conflicts or maintenance issues, or simply because they desire a new assignment.
- Students are directed to speak with their building administrators, such as the Residential Operations Manager, Resident Assistant, and/or Resident Director, to discuss room change procedures, policies and any issues that may involved in their room.
- After approval for a Room Changes, residents utilize the MyHousing system on TUportal to select a new space.

Off-Campus Housing Assistance

- Students who are in search of off-campus housing typically secure their own housing accommodations, and they can consult with Temple's Off-Campus Living team to search for options in the area that meet their needs.
- Students can search for off-campus options online at <https://offcampus.temple.edu/>. All properties listed on this site submit an active Philadelphia rental license to the Off-Campus Living team as a condition of their listing, and students can filter for characteristics like price, number of bedrooms, location, etc.

- In May 2023, Temple University established the Assistant Director for Off-Campus Living and Customer Service position to support students in navigating off-campus housing options. Effective May 2025, the position became part of Temple's Essential Needs Hub and was retitled **Associate Director of Student Advocacy**. The position, along with a team of student staff members, supports students seeking off-campus housing.
- Temple's off-campus housing portal features apartment complexes and local rental listings that offer living experiences comparable to on-campus housing.
- Since fall 2024, the Off-Campus Living team has partnered with the Beasley School of Law to offer a **Landlord-Tenant Help Service** through the Essential Needs Hub. Through this service, Temple law students, under attorney supervision, provide guidance and support to students experiencing legal, safety, or other concerns related to non-Temple-owned housing.

Temple University Best Nest Program

- The **Best Nest Program** helps students and families make informed off-campus housing choices within Temple's patrol zone
- Launched in November 2022, this self-certification program allows property owners to identify their units as meeting safety, security, and "good neighbor" standards defined by the university
- Properties that meet safety, security, and neighborly standards can self-certify and join the program.
- Certified properties appear on Temple's off-campus housing website and display one of two badges:
 - **Cherry Badge:** Meets core safety and community criteria
 - **Diamond Badge:** Meets enhanced standards for safety and neighbor responsibility

University Break Periods and Low Occupancy Guidelines

- Temple's undergraduate housing contracts outline break periods for Thanksgiving, Winter Break, and Spring Break.
- Students must vacate residence halls during these periods unless they request a housing extension.
- Winter Break housing incurs an additional charge (Fall and Spring Breaks do not).
- Graduate student housing contracts allow full-year residency, without required vacation.
- During low occupancy periods, residents are advised to take valuables with them.
- Guest policies remain in effect throughout university break periods.

Safety Initiatives in On-Campus Student Housing Facilities

Temple University's University Housing and Residential Life (UHRL) is committed to fostering a secure, supportive, and transformative residential community through comprehensive staff training, an accessible on-call structure, and an engaging residential curriculum.

Staff Training

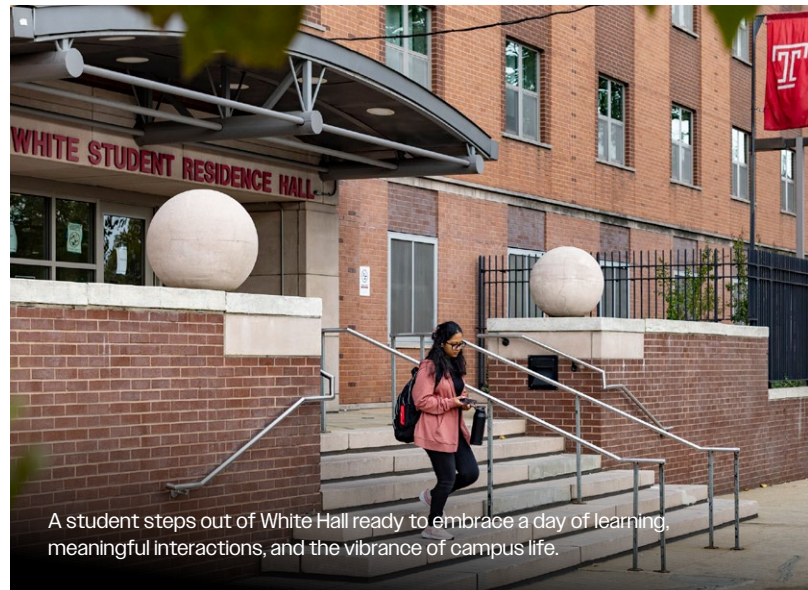
UHRL provides safety and security training for undergraduate, graduate, and full-time staff to ensure preparedness in responding to emergencies and maintaining campus safety.

- Training sessions reinforce key protocols from the Department of Public Safety and provide step-by-step guidance for handling crisis situations in residence halls.
- The Associate Director of Residential Life or designee leads introductory training for new police officers and security personnel during onboarding.
- Additional training sessions address emerging issues throughout the year, ensuring staff remain equipped to handle evolving security concerns.

Residential On-Call Staffing and Emergency Support

Temple University provides 24/7 residential support to ensure student safety and well-being while residence halls are open:

- **Resident Assistants (RAs)**
 - Two RAs are on duty in every undergraduate residence hall each night; one RA is on duty in the graduate housing residence hall

- Provide peer support, address student concerns, and foster community
- **Live-In Staff (LIS)**
 - One to two graduate or full-time staff members support residence halls year-round
 - Assist with daily operations and student needs
- **Live-Off Staff (LOS) Administrator Backup**
 - An Assistant or Associate Director is available to manage elevated or complex incidents
- **Director-Level Support**
 - The Director of Residential Life—or an appointed senior staff member—is on-call for critical safety and emergency situations

This multi-tiered staffing structure ensures students always have access to trained, responsive professionals who promote a safe and supportive residential experience.

Residential Curriculum: Safety and Personal Development

University Housing and Residential Life (UHRL) aligns with the Division of Student Affairs Curriculum by fostering student development through ongoing intentional learning and active reflection focused on three core learning goals:

- **Self-Discovery**
- **Connection**
- **Community**

The curriculum incorporates a variety of learning strategies to promote awareness and reflection on safety, security, and related topics.

Here are some ways students experience these learning goals throughout the year:

Community Meetings

- Residential Life staff host scheduled floor and area meetings throughout the year to reinforce safety policies and procedures and facilitate open discussions with residents.

Interpersonal Relationships Programs

- Events and workshops guide residents in developing healthy relationships, navigating challenges, and fostering a **respectful living environment**.

Alcohol Awareness Programs

- Conversations and activities focus on responsible decision-making, self-care, and staying safe. While topics and format may vary from year to year, the intent is always designed with student well-being in mind.

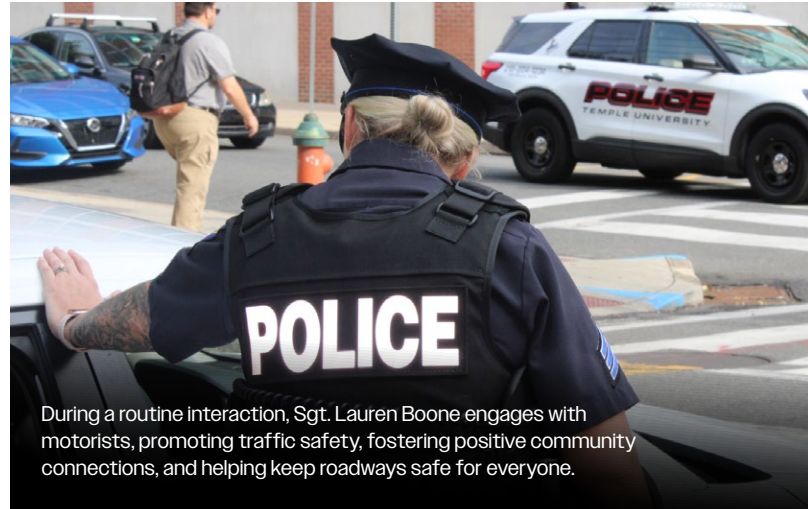
Campus Partner Collaborations

- The Residential Life team supports campus partners, such as the Wellness Resource Center and Public Safety, to host events in the residence halls. Campus partners are able to schedule programs that help to raise awareness of available resources, answer questions, and provide support regarding safety, wellness, and student services.

At Temple University, Housing and Residential Life (UHRL) prioritize creating safe and supportive spaces on campus and promoting independence and growth. With caring staff, easy-to-access emergency resources, and interactive learning programs, we empower residents to be informed and involved. By working together and staying proactive, we build a responsible, secure community where students thrive and progress beyond their on-campus residential experience.

Missing Student Notification and Response Protocol

Temple University remains committed to swift action and transparent communication in missing student cases. By utilizing these protocols, the university ensures that concerns are addressed promptly and with the appropriate support systems in place, Temple University encourages all students to identify an emergency contact through TUPortal (tuportal.temple.edu), under the Student Tools tab. Students who reside in on-campus housing at either the Main Campus or at the School of Podiatry have the additional option of identifying a confidential missing person contact in the event that the student is determined to be missing. The missing persons contact is distinct from the “emergency contact”: the missing persons contact is registered confidentially, and only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers engaged in a missing person investigation have access to this missing person contact information.

Reporting a Missing Student

If a member of the Temple community has reasons to believe that a student residing in on-campus housing is missing, they should immediately contact:

- **Temple Police at (215) 204-1234 or 1-1234 from a campus phone.**
- **Use Code Blue emergency phones located across campus for immediate assistance.**

Anyone receiving a missing student report should immediately forward the information to **Temple Police**.

Residential Life Missing Student Protocol

Residential Life staff follow a structured missing student/wellness check protocol to ensure swift action. The UHRL Missing Student Protocol for Student Staff Protocol includes:

Step 1: Gather information about the missing student.

- What is their name, TUID, and room #?
- What is their contact information (cell phone #, email, etc.)?
- Where was the student last seen?
- What was the last communication with the student?
- What was the student wearing, if known?
- How was the student behaving in the most recent interaction (anxious, erratic, depressed, etc.)?

Step 2: Collect information about the person(s) reporting.

- What is their name, TUID (if applicable), and room # (if applicable)?
- What is their phone # (so that updates can be provided later)?
- What is their relation to the student (parent, friend, roommate, etc.)?
- Contact Live-In Staff (LIS) for further assistance

Step 3: Activate Residential Life Support Live-In Staff (LIS) Protocol

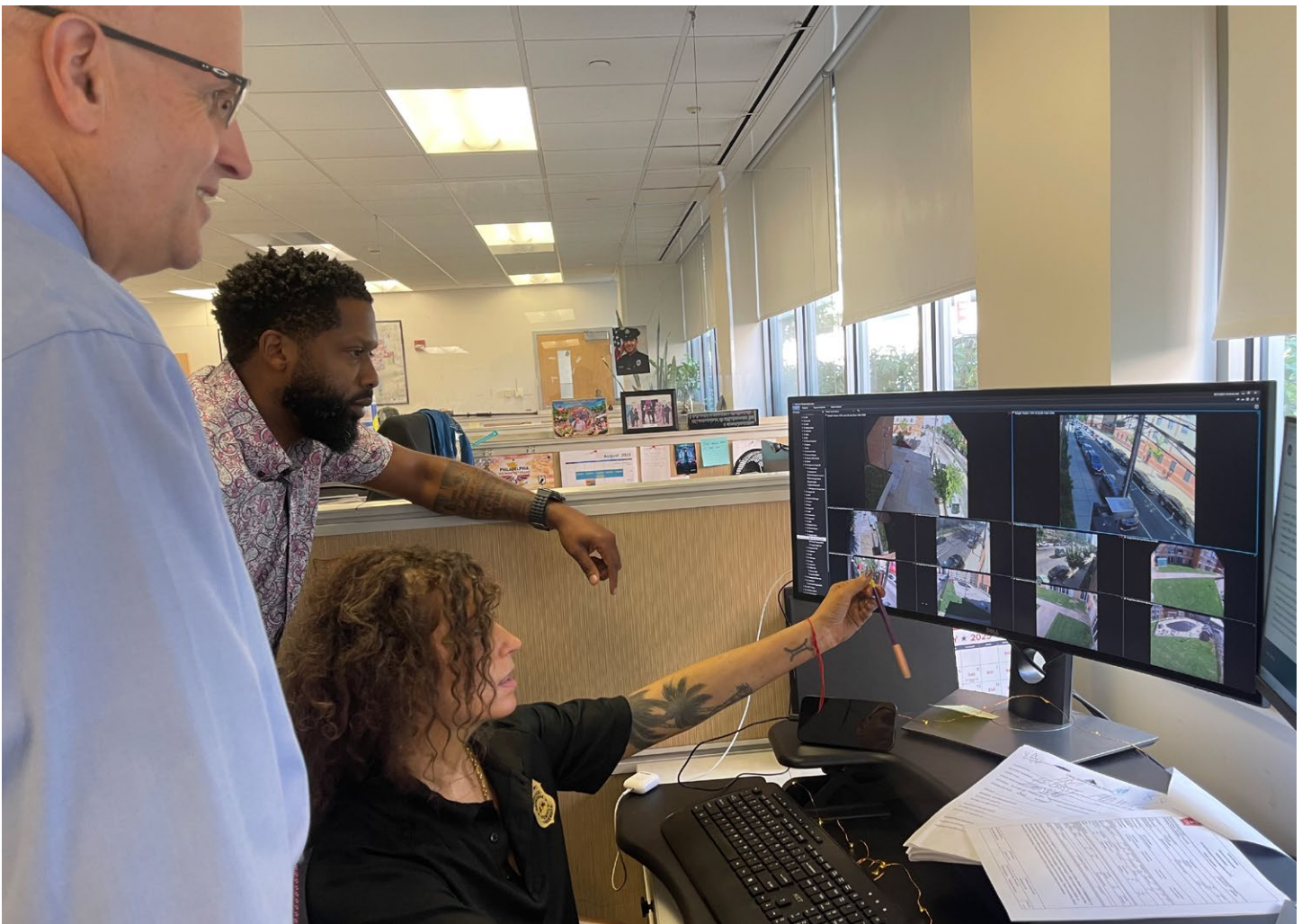
- Complete the Room Entry/Wellness Check Protocol
- Contact the (Live Off Staff) if it is determined that the student is a missing person.
- If the student is not found, alert Temple Police about the missing student to continue the search and document as a community concern in Advocate, a university recording-keeping database. Staff are expected to consult with LOS about placing a memo at the desk in the event the student returns to the hall.

Temple University Police Department Response Protocols

If Temple Police determine that a student is missing, the following actions take place:

- Notification to Local Authorities – Temple Police notify the Philadelphia Police Department or other local law enforcement, regardless of whether the student has identified a confidential missing person contact.
- Notification to University Officials – For students residing in on-campus housing, Temple Police will also notify the Director of Residential Life or their designee.
- Notification of Emergency Contacts
 - The Director of Residential Life or their designee will notify the student's designated contact within 24 hours after the determination that the student is missing.
 - If the student is under 18 years old and not emancipated, the Director of Residential Life or their designee will promptly notify the student's parent or guardian in addition to the student's designated contact.





Commitment to Student Safety and Well-Being

At Temple University, we recognize that college life brings both exciting opportunities and meaningful challenges. We are committed to helping students navigate those experiences with confidence and care. By equipping students with practical tools, meaningful connections, and responsive support systems, we encourage them to prioritize their well-being, strengthen their networks, and seek help when needed. Through a campus culture guided by empathy, awareness, and active engagement, every individual is empowered to feel supported, inspired, and ready to explore their full potential.



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Drug and Alcohol Use Policy

Temple University is committed to creating a safe, healthy campus environment by enforcing policies around drug and alcohol use:

Prohibited Conduct

- The unlawful possession, use, consumption, distribution, or manufacture of drugs and alcohol on university property or as part of any university-related activity is strictly prohibited.
- It is illegal to sell, furnish, or provide alcohol to anyone under the age of 21, and the use or possession of alcohol by individuals under 21 is strictly prohibited.

Policy Violations and Consequences

Student Accountability

Students are responsible for knowing and adhering to the **Student Conduct Code**. Violations of drug or alcohol laws may result in disciplinary sanctions, including fines, revocation of privileges, reprimands, probation, suspension, expulsion, or loss of university housing as outlined in the Code.

Program-Specific Accountability:

Students participating in Athletics, Greek Life, and Residential Life must adhere to supplemental program-specific requirements, and violations involving drug or alcohol policies may result in additional disciplinary action and sanctions.

Parental Notification:

Parents or guardians may be notified when an underage student violates alcohol or drug policies, consistent with FERPA allowances.

Employee Accountability

- Staff who violate drug or alcohol policies may face disciplinary action, including termination.

Legal Enforcement

- Temple Police uphold laws involving controlled substances and underage alcohol use.
- Offenses may carry criminal penalties, including fines or imprisonment. The unlawful possession, use, consumption, distribution, or manufacture of drugs and alcohol on university property or as part of any university-related activity is strictly prohibited.

The transition to college provides many unique opportunities for new experiences and personal growth. Students thrive when they make thoughtful decisions, build positive connections, and use campus resources to navigate challenges beyond the classroom with confidence.



Medical Amnesty Policy

Temple University strongly encourages students to seek **immediate medical assistance** for themselves or others experiencing severe intoxication due to drug or alcohol use. Students in need of medical care should contact **Temple Police at (215-204-1234) or dial 9-1-1** without hesitation.

To prioritize student safety, the university grants medical amnesty to individuals seeking emergency medical treatment for drug or alcohol-related incidents. No student who requests medical assistance—either for themselves or another person—will face disciplinary action solely for violating drug or alcohol policies as outlined in the ***Student Conduct Code***.

However, medical amnesty does not apply in cases involving other criminal activities, including but not limited to assault, property damage, or the possession or distribution of other illegal substances. Additionally, the intoxicated student may be required to participate in the university's Drug and Alcohol Education Program as a condition of receiving medical amnesty.

Drug and Alcohol Education and Prevention

The Wellness Resource Center (WRC) leads the university's alcohol and other drug prevention efforts. Staffed by experienced professionals and Certified Peer Educators, the WRC promotes holistic wellness and student connection through engaging programs and services. Using a harm reduction approach rooted in public health and health education, the WRC empowers students to make informed, independent choices by sharing accurate, up-to-date information about substances they may encounter during their time at Temple and beyond.

The Wellness Resource Center offers a range of programs and initiatives designed to provide students, faculty, and staff with accurate, up-to-date information that supports a healthy and informed campus environment.

Peer-Facilitated Programs

Student organizations, academic courses, athletic teams, and other campus groups can request interactive wellness programs led by trained Peer Educators from the Wellness Resource Center.

Let's Talk About Alcohol

Students explore their personal choices around alcohol, including reasons they might choose to drink or not, through interactive games, activities, and open discussions. The workshop encourages reflection, builds awareness of health and social impacts, and teaches practical ways to keep themselves and their fellow Owls safe when alcohol is involved.

Let's Talk About Cannabis

Cannabis is a commonly used substance among college students, and there's a lot of information out there—some accurate, some not. This program provides reliable facts about cannabis use, including its short- and long-term effects, to help students make informed choices.

Let's Talk About Harm Reduction and Naloxone Training

Students learn what harm reduction looks and feels like in practice. This workshop defines harm reduction, explores its goals, and discusses strategies for reducing stigma. Once equipped with real world examples on campus and within the greater community, students learn how to administer Naloxone in the event of a suspected opioid overdose.

Let's Talk About Nicotine and Tobacco

Temple University is a tobacco-free campus. In this program, students gain a general understanding of nicotine, tobacco, and their impacts on individual and collective health and well-being.

Let's Talk About Study Drugs

In this workshop, students learn about what study drugs are and their effects, how to protect their prescriptions, and protective behaviors. Students are also encouraged to learn and reflect on stress-management techniques without substances.

Director of the Wellness Resource Center, Liz Zadnik, invites students, faculty, and staff to visit, explore informative materials, and discuss available well-being support with team members.



Expanding Wellness: Additional Health Promotion Efforts

BASICS (Brief Alcohol Screening and Intervention for College Students)

Following a hospitalization, typically related to a medical amnesty incident, students are invited to participate in a one-on-one conversation with the Wellness Resource Center. Through the BASICS program, students have the opportunity to explore their relationship with alcohol, reflect on their attitudes and behaviors related to alcohol use, and receive support in making choices that align with their values and promote their overall health, well-being, and personal goals.

CHOICES About Alcohol

The Wellness Resource Center facilitates CHOICES, an alcohol education program for students sanctioned due to a first-time violation of the Student Drug and Alcohol Policy, a second alcohol-related violation within University Housing and Residential Life, or use of the Medical Amnesty Policy. This interactive group session helps students understand the effects of alcohol on the body and encourages personal reflection on alcohol-related behaviors.

Social Norms Messaging

The Wellness Resource Center promotes positive social norms through printed materials, campus signage, and digital platforms, including social media. Messaging educates students on Temple's Medical Amnesty Policy, offers strategies for substance-free socializing and wellness, and provides accurate information about substances such as alcohol, stimulants, and hallucinogens.

“Welcome to The Nest” Online Prevention Programs

Developed in collaboration with campus partners, “Welcome to The Nest” is an online program created specifically for Temple University students. These mandatory modules for all new undergraduate, graduate, and professional students serve as an accessible way to provide essential information on sexual violence, consent, alcohol and other drugs, campus policies, and available resources. They lay the groundwork for ongoing programming and events throughout the academic year that continue to engage students on these critical topics.

Harm Reduction Educational Events

Beginning in Spring 2025, the Wellness Resource Center partnered with College of Public Health faculty and local harm reduction organizations to host a panel discussion, resource fair, and naloxone training for the campus community. Harm Reduction in Action has become a recurring semester event, and has provided accurate information on harm reduction strategies, addressed stigma surrounding substance use, and offered hands-on instruction for administering naloxone (Narcan) to reverse opioid overdoses.

Fostering a Supportive Community for Students in Recovery

Temple University is dedicated to fostering a supportive, recovery-friendly community for students overcoming substance use challenges. Through student-led initiatives and educational programs, we aim to cultivate connections, understanding, and meaningful support for individuals in recovery.

Wise choices made in the nest lay the foundation for a journey filled with purpose, growth, and boundless possibility.



Temple Collegiate Recovery

Temple Collegiate Recovery is a student-run organization designed to create a welcoming, judgment-free space for students in recovery. The group emphasizes peer support, helping members build a strong foundation for long-term recovery while fostering friendships and solidarity.

Temple Tuttleman Counseling Services

The Campus Alcohol and Substance Awareness (CASA) unit within Tuttleman Counseling services is a group of specialized counselors that offer comprehensive services designed to support students that are concerned with either their own or a loved one's substance use.

Recovery Ally Training

Temple offers Recovery Ally Training for students, faculty, and staff who want to be advocates for recovery on campus. This training equips participants with the tools to support students navigating substance use disorders (SUD) and the recovery process.

Facilitators provide:

- A foundational understanding of SUD and recovery
- Insights into building a recovery-friendly campus community
- Information on university resources and support systems for students in recovery

By participating in Recovery Ally Training, members of the Temple community help cultivate a culture of care, connection, and empowerment for students on their recovery journey.

Drug and Alcohol Counseling and Treatment Programs

Temple University is committed to providing confidential support and treatment options for students and employees facing substance use challenges. Whether seeking counseling, recovery resources, or referrals to specialized care, there are services available to help.

Confidential Substance Use Support for Students

Students seeking help with drug or alcohol concerns can access free, confidential services through Tuttleman Counseling Services.

- Individual and group counseling for substance use
- Mental health support programs
- Referrals to specialized care when needed



A critical campus resource, this space offers counseling services and student and employee health care in a comfortable, confidential setting.

Definition of Hazing

Hazing, Aggravated Hazing, and Organizational Hazing (collectively, “hazing”) are prohibited by this policy. These terms are defined as follows:

- A. **Hazing:** A person commits the offense of hazing if the person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly, for the purpose of initiating, admitting, or affiliating a minor or student into or with an organization, or for the purpose of continuing or enhancing a minor or student’s membership or status in an organization, causes, coerces, or forces a minor or student to engage in activities, including, but not limited to, the following:
 1. Violating Federal or State criminal law;
 2. Consuming any food, liquid, alcoholic liquid, drug, or other substance which subjects the minor or student to a risk of emotional or physical harm;
 3. Enduring brutality of a physical nature, including whipping, beating, branding, calisthenics, forced exercise or exposure to the elements;
 4. Enduring brutality of a mental nature, including activity adversely affecting the mental health or dignity of the individual, sleep deprivation, exclusion from social contact or conduct that could result in extreme embarrassment;
 5. Enduring brutality of a sexual nature;
 6. Enduring sexual abuse or being forced to engage in sexual acts;
 7. Enduring any other activity which could adversely affect the health and safety of the minor or student.
- B. **Aggravated Hazing:** A person commits the offense of aggravated hazing if the subject commits a violation of Hazing that results in serious bodily injury or death to the minor or student.
- C. **Organizational Hazing:** An organization commits the offense of Organizational Hazing if the organization intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly promotes or facilitates a violation of Hazing or Aggravated Hazing.

Reporting Hazing

Temple encourages all members of the university community who believe that they have witnessed, experienced, or are otherwise aware of conduct that might constitute Hazing, Aggravated Hazing, or Organizational Hazing to report that information to:

The university strongly encourages students to call the Department of Public Safety for medical assistance for themselves or for other individuals who are dangerously under the influence of drugs or alcohol. No student seeking medical treatment for the effects of drug or alcohol use will be subject to university discipline for violations pertaining to drug or alcohol use.

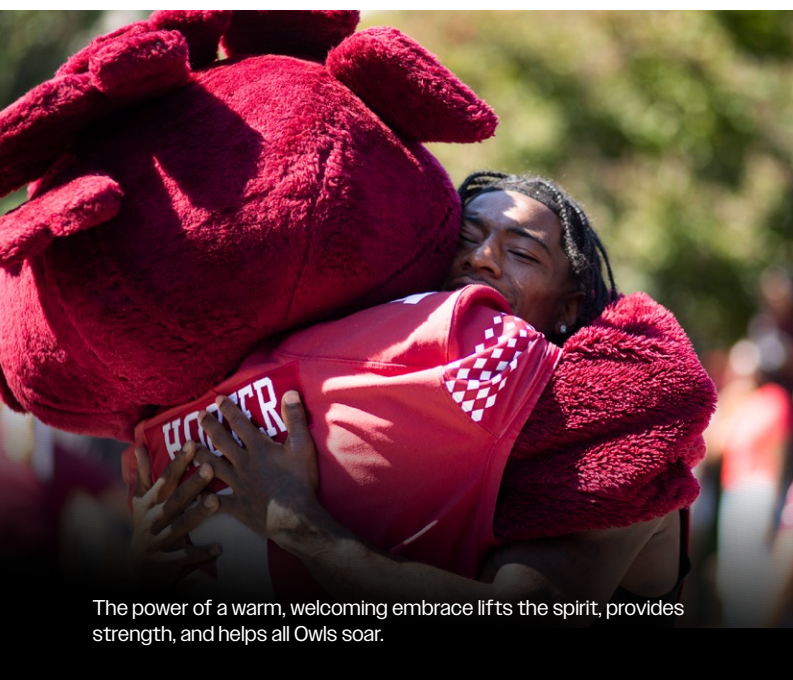

The Hotline provides an option to report anonymously.

Investigation Process

Upon receiving a report, the university will:

- Initiate a formal review to determine if hazing occurred
- Conduct interviews and gather evidence
- Apply appropriate sanctions if a violation is confirmed
- Notify relevant parties of the outcome

Applicable Laws

Temple University complies with all local, state, and federal laws related to hazing, including Pennsylvania's Timothy J. Piazza Anti-Hazing Law and the Stop Campus Hazing Act.

Prevention and Awareness Programs

The university provides research-informed, campus-wide prevention programs that include:

- Bystander intervention training
- Ethical leadership development
- Orientation sessions for student organizations, athletic teams, and University Housing and Residential Life student staff
- Ongoing education for faculty, staff, and students

These initiatives aim to stop hazing before it starts and promote a culture of accountability and care.

Temple University's CARE Team

Temple University's CARE Team—which stands for **Crisis, Assessment, Response, and Education**—is a cross-campus group dedicated to supporting students who may be experiencing distress or exhibiting concerning behaviors. The team works collaboratively to assess situations, gather relevant information, and implement thoughtful strategies to promote student well-being and campus safety.

When to Refer a Student

You can refer a student to the CARE Team if you notice behaviors such as:

- Unusual or erratic actions
- Prolonged or unexplained absences
- Threatening language or behavior
- Expressions of suicidal thoughts
- Concerning themes in assignments or conversations
- Any behavior that may pose a safety risk to the student or others

How to Make a Referral

If you're concerned about a student, you can submit a confidential referral through the CARE Team [referral form](#).

In urgent situations, contact Temple Police at 215-204-1234 (off campus) or 1-1234 (on campus).

Compassionate Support

If you feel safe doing so, consider expressing your concern directly to the student. You can also offer to walk them to Tuttleman Counseling Services or help connect them with other campus resources.



Weapons Prohibition Policy

Temple University is committed to maintaining a safe and secure campus environment. As outlined in the ***Student Conduct Code*** and the Employee Manual, the possession, use, sale, or storage of weapons or hazardous substances is strictly prohibited on university property.

Prohibited Items

The following items are not permitted on campus, as they pose a threat to health and safety:

- **Firearms**, including guns, pistols, rifles, stun guns, ghost or 3 D printed, firearms air rifles, Orrbeez, paint ball, and pellet guns
- **Explosive materials**, such as fireworks, ammunition, gunpowder, and other flammable substances
- **Weapons**, including knives, batons, and other dangerous objects
- **Replicas** of firearms or other hazardous items

Temple University will confiscate any prohibited items, and students found in possession of a firearm will receive an interim suspension pending further review under the student conduct process.

Enforcement and Consequences

The possession of firearms or weapons is strictly prohibited for all individuals on campus, regardless of licensure. The only exceptions are Temple Police officers and authorized law enforcement personnel acting in an official capacity.

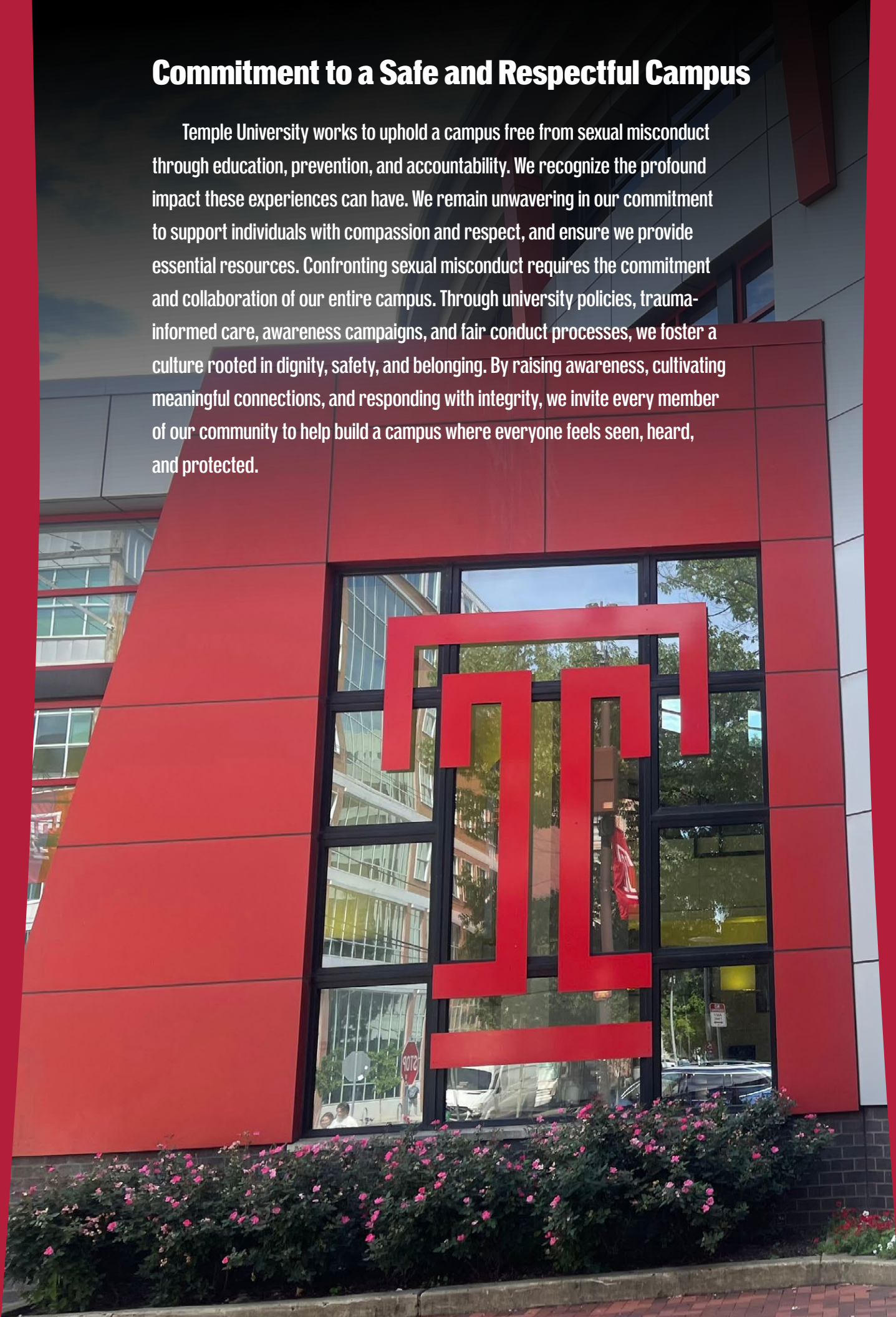
All violations are subject to investigation, and individuals may face disciplinary or legal consequences.

- Arrest or criminal citations under local, state, or federal law
- University disciplinary action, including suspension or other sanctions

Temple University Police Officers are certified law enforcement professionals, annually trained by the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission. They are authorized to carry firearms, batons, and other protective equipment in accordance with their duties.

Commitment to a Safe and Respectful Campus

Temple University works to uphold a campus free from sexual misconduct through education, prevention, and accountability. We recognize the profound impact these experiences can have. We remain unwavering in our commitment to support individuals with compassion and respect, and ensure we provide essential resources. Confronting sexual misconduct requires the commitment and collaboration of our entire campus. Through university policies, trauma-informed care, awareness campaigns, and fair conduct processes, we foster a culture rooted in dignity, safety, and belonging. By raising awareness, cultivating meaningful connections, and responding with integrity, we invite every member of our community to help build a campus where everyone feels seen, heard, and protected.





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Temple University's Policy on Sexual Misconduct

Temple University adheres to relevant legal and regulatory authority in its policies, including that related to sexual misconduct. Yet our approach to preventing and addressing sexual misconduct goes beyond fulfilling legal requirements. Rather, Temple is committed to our community's well-being and strength.

By clearly communicating about consent and misconduct, the university outlines expectations and prohibited behavior. Providing multiple reporting paths: and prompt support services helps to ensure individuals feel heard, safe, and respected. Through educational events and ongoing campaigns, every Owl is equipped with the knowledge and tools to recognize, prevent, and respond to harmful behavior. Grounded in fair accountability through impartial investigations, transparent processes, and relevant sanctions, the university demonstrates that violations carry real consequences. Temple analyzes data and updates our programs—building resilience through feedback and best practices. This framework moves us beyond a checklist of regulations toward a culture of genuine care, shared responsibility, and collective strength.

This section will address:

Temple University prohibits sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment, which are described in detail in the ***Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct Policy***. Prohibited conduct under this policy are collectively referred to as "sexual misconduct."

Reducing Sexual Misconduct through Clear Understanding and Expectations

Temple University is committed to fostering a safe and respectful environment, free from sexual misconduct. The following definitions, as outlined in the university's policy, provide clarity on key terms and expectations regarding consent and other forms of prohibited conduct. Understanding the definitions below, which

are implemented to comply with relevant legal and regulatory obligations, is essential for promoting awareness and ensuring a shared commitment to prevention and accountability.

Understanding Consent in Sexual Activity

Consent is a foundational principle— it must be clear, informed, and freely given. Engaging in any of the below prohibited behaviors may constitute criminal offenses in addition to violating Temple policy.

Definition of Consent:

- A knowing, voluntary, and clear agreement—expressed through words or actions—to engage in sexual activity.
- Must reflect mutual understanding and willingness.

Key Principles:

- Ongoing: Consent must continue throughout the sexual activity.
- Revocable: Consent can be withdrawn at any time.
- Incapacity: Consent is invalid if given by someone who cannot make a reasonable judgment due to:
 - Intoxication or unconsciousness
 - Youth or mental impairment
 - Threat, coercion, or pressure

Avoid Misconceptions:

- Prior consent does **not** imply future consent.
- Mere assent is **not** valid if the person is unable to understand or evaluate the situation.

Definitions of Sexual Assault

Sexual Assault:

- Occurs when a person engages in sexual intercourse or deviates sexual intercourse with another person without effective consent



In moments of challenge, this space near Shusterman Hall gives students a place to pause, reflect, and reset.

Rape:

- Includes any penetration—however slight—of the vagina or anus with a body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ, without the victim’s consent
- Also includes sexual intercourse:
 - By forcible compulsion or threats that prevent reasonable resistance
 - With a person who is unconscious or unaware the act is occurring

University Policy:

- Temple prohibits all forms of sexual assault including:
 - Rape
 - Sodomy
 - Sexual assault with an object
 - Fondling

Understanding Domestic Violence

Temple University recognizes domestic violence as defined by relevant laws and regulations,¹ including acts committed by individuals in close personal relationships with the victim.

Temple serves as a gateway to new paths, where opportunity meets ambition and futures take flight.

**Who Can Be a Perpetrator:**

- Current or former spouse or intimate partner
- Person sharing a child with the victim
- Person cohabitating or who has cohabitated as a spouse
- Person similarly situated to a spouse
- Any individual whose acts are covered under Pennsylvania’s domestic or family violence laws

Note on Pennsylvania Law:

Pennsylvania does not define “domestic violence” as a standalone statute but defines “abuse” within family or household relationships.

Abuse Includes:

1. Causing or attempting to cause bodily injury or committing sexual offenses (e.g., rape, sexual assault, incest), with or without a weapon
2. Placing someone in reasonable fear of imminent serious bodily injury
3. Committing false imprisonment
4. Physically or sexually abusing minor children
5. Repeated conduct (e.g., stalking or following) that places someone in reasonable fear of bodily injury

Note: This applies only to civil proceedings under domestic violence laws, not criminal prosecutions under Title 18

These definitions guide Temple’s response to domestic violence and support compliance with the Clery Act and Title IX.

Understanding Dating Violence

Dating violence refers to acts of violence committed by someone in a romantic or intimate relationship with the complainant.

Relationship Criteria:

- The individuals are or were in a romantic or intimate social relationship
- Determined based on the complainant’s statement and consideration of:
 - Length of the relationship
 - Type of relationship
 - Frequency of interaction

Includes:

- Sexual or physical abuse
- Threats of such abuse

Excludes:

- Acts that meet the definition of domestic violence

Events like TempleFest offer a welcoming way for students to connect with key university resources and experience the energy of campus life, providing the chance to explore more than 350 student clubs, departments, organizations, and local vendors before the academic semester begins.

Understanding Stalking

Stalking involves a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable individual to:

- Fear for their own safety or the safety of others, or
- Experience severe emotional distress, or
- Meet the definition of stalking under Pennsylvania law²

Course of Conduct:

- Involves two or more acts, which may include:
 - Following, monitoring, observing, or surveilling
 - Threatening or repeatedly communicating (directly or indirectly)
 - Interfering with the person's property

Methods May Include:

- Any action, device, or means
- Use of third parties to carry out the conduct

Understanding Sexual Exploitation

Sexual exploitation involves taking non-consensual sexual advantage of another person for the benefit of someone other than the individual being exploited.

Examples Include:

- Live streaming, taking, and/or disseminating pictures, video, or audio recording of another person engaged in sexual activity without the consent of all involved in the activity.
- Exposing one's genitals in non-consensual circumstances, including via online communications.
- Sexual voyeurism, such as watching another engage in sexual activity or undressing without consent.
- Disrobing another person without their consent.

- Knowingly transmitting sexually transmitted infections (STI) or sexually transmitted diseases (STD) without disclosing that one is infected with an STI or STD.
- Intentionally removing, damaging, or lying about use of a prophylactic or contraceptive device (e.g., condom, female condom, or other forms of birth control) when consent has only been given for protected sexual activity.

Why These Definitions Matter

These definitions are not just legal formalities—they are the foundation for:

- Accurate Clery reporting.
- Timely warnings and emergency notifications.
- Victim support and rights.
- Institutional accountability and prevention education.

Prohibited Sexual Conduct Under Temple Policy

In addition to the above, Temple University strictly prohibits the following behaviors, including any threats or attempts to engage in them:

Non-consensual Sexual Touching:

- Intentional touching of an intimate body part (e.g., breast, buttocks, or sexual organ) for sexual gratification
- Using a sexual organ to touch any part of another person's body
- Touching any body part with the intent to initiate a sexual act

Non-consensual Sexual Acts:

- Vaginal or anal penetration with a body part or object without consent
- Vaginal, anal, or oral intercourse without consent

Educational Programming and Training

Temple University is dedicated to comprehensive education and training to prevent sexual misconduct and support a safe campus environment. The Wellness Resource Center collaborates with various university and community entities (such as the Title IX Office, Institutional Diversity, Equity, Advocacy, and Leadership, Human Resources, New Student and Family Programs, Student Conduct and Community Standards, and others) to provide educational programming and training opportunities for students, faculty, and staff. The Wellness Resource Center and Title IX Coordinator also provide annual training to University Housing and Residential Life staff on prevention strategies and response to reports of harm or violence.

The educational programs include:

Student-Focused Education and Training

Temple University offers structured educational programs to empower students with essential knowledge and resources for preventing sexual misconduct.

New Student Orientation

As part of Orientation, students are introduced to the university's ***Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct Policy*** and commitment to fostering a safe, respectful campus environment. Sessions include:

- A review of key university policies related to sexual misconduct
- An overview of campus and community resources for education, support, and reporting

“Welcome to The Nest” Online Prevention Programs

Developed in collaboration with campus partners, “Welcome to The Nest” is an online program created specifically for Temple University students. This accessible online program provides critical information on:

- Sexual violence prevention
- Consent
- Alcohol and other drug education
- Campus policies and resources

All new undergraduate, graduate, and professional students at Temple University participate in foundational programming designed to introduce key topics. These modules set the stage for ongoing events and initiatives throughout the academic year that further explore these critical issues.

Peer-Facilitated Education and Interactive Workshops

Nationally certified Peer Educators deliver educational programs to their peers. There are fifteen options; sessions of particular relevance include:

1. Let's Talk About Alcohol

Students explore their personal choices around alcohol, including reasons they might choose to drink or not,

through interactive games, activities, and open discussions. The workshop encourages reflection, builds awareness of health and social impacts, and teaches practical ways to keep themselves and their fellow Owls safe when alcohol is involved.

2. Beyond Yes and No: Building a Culture of Consent

How would we feel living in a world where all boundaries are honored? Where could we feel safe and affirmed? This workshop challenges the traditional transactional “yes/no” model of consent, inviting participants to reflect on how respect, communication, and boundary-setting can foster a campus culture where personal autonomy is valued, and consent is a shared, ongoing practice.

3. Take Action, Take Care

This program teaches students how to support community wellness through positive action. Participants learn:

- The bystander effect and how it impacts intervention.
- How to differentiate emergent vs. non-emergent situations.
- Practical strategies for stepping safely.

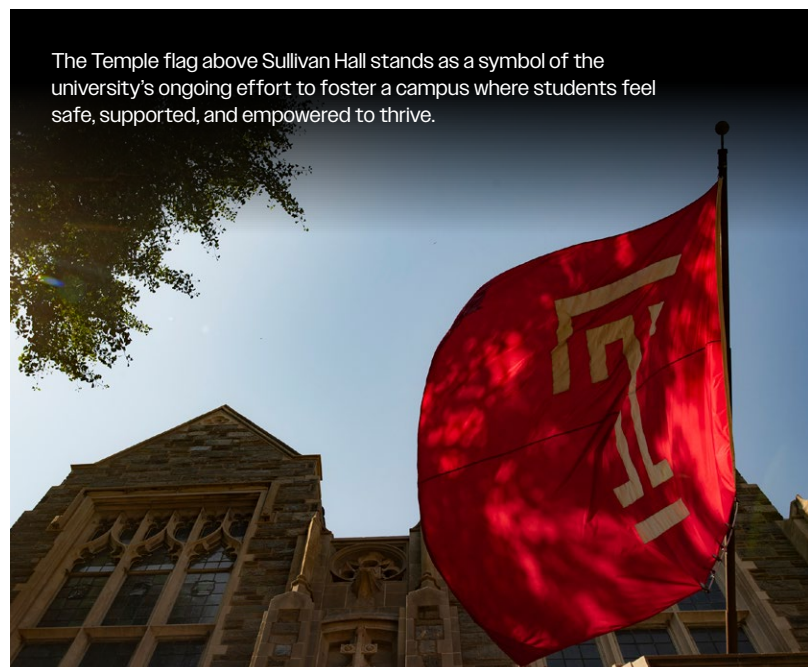
Scenarios include discussions on mental health, body image, alcohol/drug use, sexual health, and sexual assault intervention.

Faculty and Staff Programming, Training and Awareness

New Employee Training

Temple University offers thorough onboarding education for all newly hired employees, with training that includes:

- ***Clery Act Overview*** – Understanding legal responsibilities related to campus safety and incident reporting
- ***Campus Security Authority (CSA) Roles*** – Duties of designated personnel in reporting and prevention

- **Sexual Misconduct Response** – Temple's *Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct Policy* and the university's commitment to prevention. Sessions include:

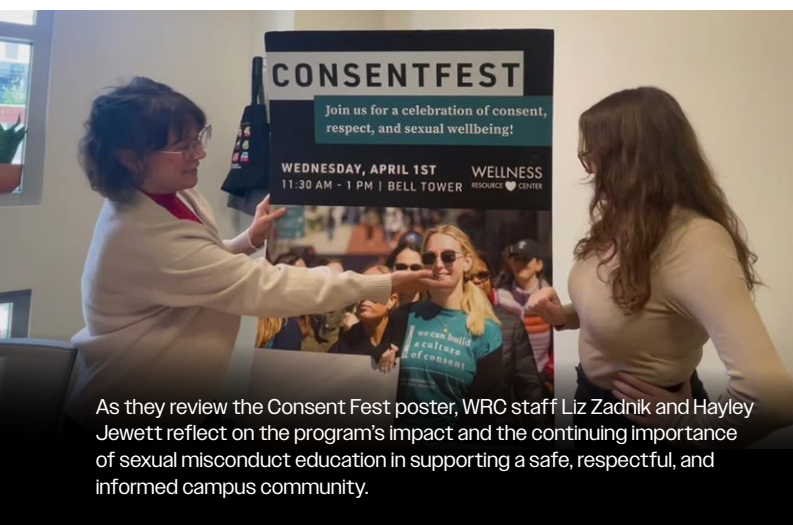
- A review of key university policies related to sexual misconduct
- An overview of campus and community resources for education, support, and reporting

To support accessibility and ensure ongoing compliance, the Human Resources Department continues to enhance its approach by integrating self-paced online training modules to make safety education accessible and effective for faculty and staff.

Temple's Department of Human Resources provides specialized training sessions for university employees, covering:

- Definitions of sexual misconduct and applicable state and federal laws
- Support resources for employees
- Workplace accommodations, including schedule modifications, assignment changes, referrals to law enforcement, and Employee Assistance Program (EAP) resources

Campus-Wide Awareness and Prevention Initiatives

Temple University promotes community engagement through high-impact events and campaigns, including:

- **Social Norms Messaging:**
Digital signage, campus resources, and social media campaigns are used to share messages that promote:
 - Sexual and relationship violence prevention
 - Alcohol and drug awareness
 - Medical amnesty policies
 - Access to university support services

The Clothesline Project:

A powerful living arts project that brings visibility to interpersonal violence. During the event, a display features shirts designed by current and former Temple students, each reflecting personal or shared experiences of abuse, survivorship, and resilience. The display fosters community awareness and healing, and is accompanied by educational activities, informational resources, and access to support services.

Held each semester, this project marks Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October and Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April.

Consent Fest:

An annual campus event launching Sexual Assault Awareness Month, this resource fair and educational space invites all members of the Temple community to learn more about sexuality, consent, and explore how to support the movement to end sexual violence.

- **Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) Programming**
Temple University's SAAM initiatives promote education, prevention, and community support through a variety of events and outreach initiatives, including:

The Clothesline Project

Described fully earlier in this section.

Denim Day Resource Tables

On-campus display areas offer informational materials and engagement opportunities tied to sexual violence awareness and survivor support.

Denim Day – Standing in Solidarity

Students, faculty, and staff are invited to wear denim to challenge victim-blaming and demonstrate support for survivors. The initiative encourages open dialogue about prevention, consent, and access to campus resources, with events led by student organizations.

Awareness Campaigns

Student groups host digital and in-person outreach efforts throughout April to elevate messages of safety, intervention, and support within the campus community.

Temple University Resources

Tuttleman Counseling Services provides counseling services to students who have experienced sexual misconduct, including sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment.

Temple University's Sexual Assault Counseling and Education (SACE) program staff provides:

- Crisis intervention counseling for students affected by sexual misconduct.
- Referrals to additional support services.

Temple's Department of Human Resources conducts training sessions for university employees covering:

Partnerships with Community-Based Providers (PA Act 55 Compliance)

In accordance with Pennsylvania Act 55, Temple University maintains memoranda of understanding (MOUs) with one local rape crisis center and one local domestic violence program to support students through direct services and educational initiatives.

- **WOAR – Philadelphia Center Against Sexual Violence**
WOAR provides 24/7 rape crisis support. Students can access services through the hotline, and if needed, meet with a WOAR representative on Temple's Main Campus. WOAR also offers educational programming and consults on policies and practices.
- **Lutheran Settlement House (LSH)**
LSH delivers comprehensive domestic violence support. Students can contact the 24-hour Philadelphia Domestic Violence Hotline to be connected to services, provided by LSH and partner organizations. LSH also supports education and policy consultation across campus.

Supportive Resources for Community Care

- **Philadelphia Sexual Assault Response Center (PSARC)**
PSARC is a private, nonprofit center providing forensic and medical care to sexual assault victims aged 16 and older. Their mission is to offer expert assessment and support for survivors in Philadelphia. PSARC's program coordinator also partners with Temple University to co-facilitate educational sessions and share valuable resources with students.
- **Our Wave**
Our Wave is a nonprofit organization that offers digital spaces for survivors to share their experiences and build community. Co-led by Temple University Nursing faculty, Our Wave provides resources for students and collaborates on educational messaging through social media campaigns.

• Central Division Victim Services (CDVS)

Central Division Victim Services is a community based comprehensive victim services organization. CDVS services all types of crime victims, co-victims, and witnesses in the 9th and 22nd Police Districts in Lower North and Center City Philadelphia. CDVS serves as a resource and support for Temple students, participating in resource fairs and offering presentations to student leaders.

Reporting Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Stalking, and Sexual Exploitation

Individuals who have experienced sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual exploitation, should get to a place of safety immediately and are encouraged to obtain necessary medical treatment promptly.

Individuals should report the incident as soon as possible, since time is a critical factor for evidence collection and preservation. As time passes, evidence may dissipate or become lost or unavailable, thereby making investigation, possible prosecution, disciplinary proceedings, or obtaining protection from abuse orders related to the incident more difficult.

If an individual chooses not to file a complaint immediately, they are still able to speak with Temple Police or other law enforcement to preserve evidence in case they decide to pursue action later.

Individuals may also choose to be transported to the [Philadelphia Sexual Assault Response Center](#), where they can undergo a forensic examination and choose to begin an investigation through the Philadelphia Police Department's Special Victims Unit. Support for transportation can be provided by Temple University Public Safety or by contacting WOAR's hotline at 215-985-3333. Individuals can access sexual assault forensic exams regardless of an accompanying law enforcement or criminal justice investigation.



Members of Tuttleman Counseling Services warmly welcome visitors and direct them to appropriate support within the array of available services.

Contacting Law Enforcement

Temple Police

Individuals can report incidents of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and sexual exploitation occurring on Temple's Main Campus, Health Sciences Center, Center City, Podiatry, and Ambler campuses to Temple Police by dialing 1-1234 (from a campus phone) or calling (215) 204-1234 (from a non-campus phone). Temple Police will assist individuals in reporting the incident to local law enforcement, should they choose.

Alternatively, individuals can contact local law enforcement directly by dialing 9-1-1 may report the incident directly to local law enforcement by calling 9-1-1 should they prefer.

Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual exploitation occurring at other campuses, including Fort Washington and Harrisburg, or off-campus should be reported to local law enforcement at 9-1-1 or the local country's equivalent.

Reporting an Incident to Temple University

Regardless of where the incident occurs, individuals may also report to Temple University's Title IX Coordinator.

Assistance Notifying Authorities

- If desired by the individual who has experienced the sexual misconduct, Temple University personnel will assist the individual in notifying local authorities and receiving the necessary medical treatments and tests.
- Filing a police report provides the opportunity for the collection of evidence and assures the victim access to confidential counseling through the City of Philadelphia in addition to resources available through the university.
- Reporting an incident of sexual misconduct does not require prosecution of a crime, nor will it subject the individual who reports an incident to judgment or scrutiny.
- Temple University does not tolerate retaliation against persons reporting sexual assaults, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment.
- Whether they pursue a criminal complaint or not, individuals who experience sexual misconduct may also file a complaint through Temple University administration.

The university's procedures for filing formal and informal complaints are set out below and are intended to afford a prompt response to reports of sexual misconduct, to maintain confidentiality and fairness consistent with applicable legal requirements, and to impose appropriate sanctions for violations of policy.

Confidentiality and Anonymity in Reporting Sexual Misconduct

Temple University is committed to protecting the identity of individuals who report experiencing sexual misconduct to the fullest extent of the law.

If a Complainant wishes to remain anonymous and does not consent to the disclosure of their name or other identifiable information to the Respondent, the university will provide supportive resources to the Complainant. However, anonymity may limit the university's ability to take disciplinary action.

University Procedures and Investigations

Temple University will make every reasonable effort to honor a Complainant's request for anonymity. However, in certain circumstances, an investigation into the reported conduct may be necessary.

Decisions regarding proceeding with an investigation will be made by:

- The Title IX Coordinator
- The Vice President of Public Safety
- The Dean of Students
- The Associate Vice President of Human Resources, or their designees

These officials, in coordination with the Office of University Counsel and other necessary university offices, will determine whether an investigation is warranted.

If the university initiates an investigation, the Complainant will be provided with all notices and procedural rights under the Formal Complaints section of this policy and under ***Student Conduct Proceedings in Matters of Sexual Misconduct*** (page 54).

Confidential Resources

The University offers confidential support resources for students and employees who have experienced sexual misconduct. These services provide support, counseling, information, and referrals while maintaining confidentiality. Confidential resources do not automatically report incidents to law enforcement or other authorities. However, they can help individuals understand available reporting options and provide assistance if an individual chooses to make a report.

The Title IX office, located on the 5th floor of 1810 Liacouras Walk, assists students every step of the way, from reporting incidents to rebuilding with dignity and confidence. With care and sensitivity, we explain your options, review your rights, and offer guidance that empowers you to move forward feeling heard and affirmed.



Support Options and Information About Rights

Regardless of where an incident of sexual misconduct occurs, Temple University will provide individuals who report experiencing sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, or sexual exploitation with a copy of the university's policy or a written explanation of their rights and options.

Formal and Informal Complaints of Sexual Misconduct

Temple University provides both formal and informal complaint options for individuals reporting sexual misconduct, including sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual exploitation.

The university is committed to ensuring privacy, support, and access to resources, regardless of whether a Complainant chooses to pursue a formal investigation or submit an informal report.

Formal Complaint Process

How to File a Formal Complaint

A person wishing to file a Formal Complaint of sexual misconduct may contact:

- Temple University's Title IX Coordinator
- Temple Police, who oversee investigations into such complaints

At the Complainant's request, the Philadelphia Police Department's Special Victims Unit will be contacted to lead any criminal investigation.

All Formal Complaints will be treated as privately as possible, consistent with applicable legal requirements and customary law enforcement practices.

Options for Legal and Administrative Support

Individual Complainants will be informed promptly of available

support services, as well as legal and administrative options, if reasonably available, such as protection from abuse orders through an appropriate court of law and changes to housing assignments and academic or work schedules.

Filing a Complaint with the University

Regardless of whether criminal charges are filed, individuals may submit a complaint to the university.

Based on the nature of the complaint, the university may address it under the *Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct Policy*.

Alternatively, the matter may be referred and reviewed pursuant to other applicable policies, such as the *Student Conduct Code*, the *Employee Manual*, *Rules of Conduct*, or other relevant policies.

Communication Related to Sexual Misconduct Reports

1. Referral to Student Conduct

Reports made to law enforcement may also be referred to the Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards for review under university policy. Referrals do not determine responsibility; it ensures that all reports are evaluated through the appropriate University processes.

2. Community Safety Communication

In certain circumstances, Temple University may issue a Clery-required community safety communication. These communications provide essential safety information and do not identify the Complainant or Respondent. Limited, non-identifying information about a reported suspect may be included only when necessary to promote community safety.

3. Notification of Outcomes to Parties

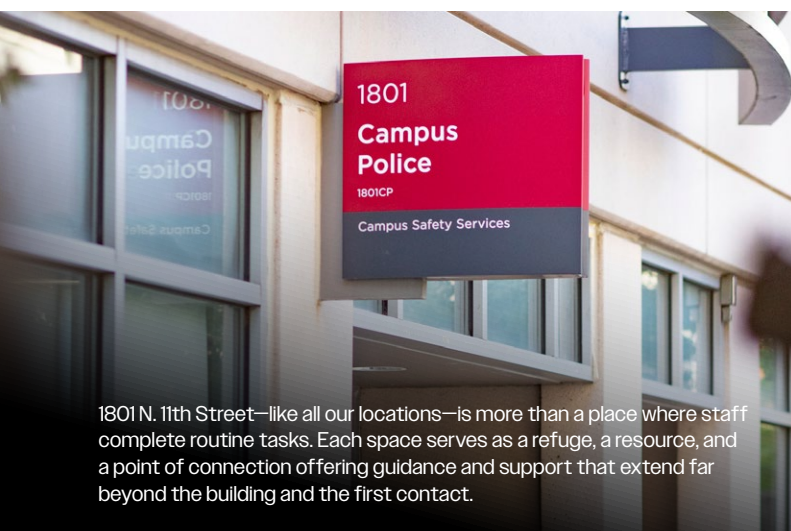
Temple University provides direct communication to the Complainant and Respondent regarding the outcome of any sexual misconduct investigation, consistent with Temple University policy and applicable federal and state requirements. These communications are private and shared only with the parties involved.

Informal Complaint Process

Who Can Report an Informal Complaint?

Any individual may bring an Informal Complaint to the attention of the university, regardless of whether they are a member of the Temple community or whether they have personally experienced the conduct at issue. A Reporter who submits an Informal Complaint may include, but is not limited to, a friend, parent of the Complainant or a witness to the sexual misconduct. The Title IX Coordinator may be contacted at any time by any of the following methods to bring an Informal Complaint to the attention of the university:

Reporting Without Filing a Formal Complaint

If a person reports to a university administrator, department head, faculty member, or Equal Opportunity Ombudsperson that they have experienced sexual misconduct but chooses not to file a Formal Complaint at that time, the Complainant will be promptly contacted by the Title IX Coordinator ([Title IX | Ethics and Compliance](#)) or their designee.

Informal Complaints to university personnel will be treated as privately as possible consistent with applicable legal requirements and safety considerations.

Supportive Measures for Informal Complaints

The Title IX Coordinator, ([Title IX | Ethics and Compliance](#)) or their designee will discuss available supportive measures and resources to understand the Complainant's wishes and to explain the process of filing a Formal Complaint should the Complainant wish to do so.

Information About Support Services

Individuals who report experiencing sexual misconduct will be promptly informed in writing of available support services, as well as legal and administrative options, if reasonably available at Temple or the local community, such as protection from abuse orders through an appropriate court of law and changes to housing assignments and academic or work schedules.

Other supportive measures that may be available are institutional stay-away orders, counseling services, financial aid advising or support, and immigration and visa information.

Student Conduct Proceedings in Matters of Sexual Misconduct

Temple University is committed to ensuring a prompt, fair, and transparent disciplinary process for matters involving sexual misconduct, including sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment.

In appropriate circumstances, **Formal Complaints of Sexual Harassment** (as defined by the university's **Policy on Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct**) may result in the initiation of disciplinary procedures, including a non-criminal fact-finding investigation.

The university disciplinary process is conducted by impartial board members or a third-party neutral, all of whom receive specialized training on:

- Sexual assault
- Domestic and dating violence
- Stalking
- Sexual exploitation
- Conducting hearings that protect complainants and ensure accountability

Training materials for the hearing process are available upon request from the Title IX Coordinator.

Key Procedural Rights

Temple University's **Student Conduct Code** and **Policy on Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct** ensure that both the Complainant and the Respondent have the following rights:

1. Notification and Participation in Hearings

- Both parties receive timely notice of meetings.
- Each has the opportunity to attend and present relevant evidence before a properly trained hearing board, which may include a third-party neutral.

2. Advisor Support Throughout the Process

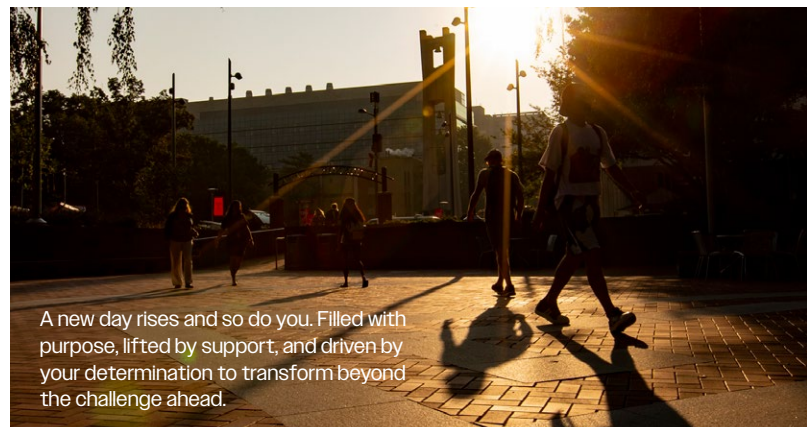
- The Complainant and the Respondent may be advised by a personal advisor of their choice, at their own expense, at any stage of the process.
- An advisor may accompany the individual to any meeting or hearing.
- If a student does not have an advisor, the university will provide one for the hearing.
- In Title IX proceedings, advisors may consult with their advisee and will be permitted to ask all relevant questions—including follow-up questions—to the other party and any witnesses during the hearing.

3. Standard for Decision-Making

- Decisions regarding responsibility are based on the "more likely than not" standard (i.e., whether it is more likely than not that the Respondent violated the **Student Conduct Code**).

4. Notification of Disciplinary Actions and Appeals

- The Complainant and the Respondent will be notified simultaneously in writing regarding:
 - Any university disciplinary actions taken against the Respondent.
 - Any changes to disciplinary actions before they become final.

5. Notification of Appeals

- In Title IX proceedings, the Complainant and the Respondent each have the right to appeal the result of the hearing and will receive notice of their rights to appeal in writing.

6. Notification of the Appeal Final Outcome

- The Complainant and the Respondent will be notified simultaneously in writing of the final result after the appeal is resolved.

Confidentiality and Protection of Student Conduct Records

Student conduct records are protected under federal privacy law and will not be released to the public except as required by law. Temple University is aware of the sensitive nature of sexual misconduct complaints and can provide accommodations to address an individual's need for separation from the Respondent, while also balancing the rights of the Respondent.

University sanctions, up to and including separation from the university, may be imposed upon those determined to have

violated the university's policies related to sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment.

For students, sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and other forms of sexual harassment may be violations of the university's **Policy on Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct** and/or the university's **Student Conduct Code**, subjecting a Respondent to disciplinary sanctions up to and including expulsion from the university.

Sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, and sexual exploitation are criminal acts which also may subject the Respondent to criminal and civil penalties under federal and state law.

Potential University Sanctions

Sanctions for students found responsible for sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and/or other forms of sexual harassment could include, individually or collectively:

- disciplinary probation, ranging from one semester up to and including "through graduation"
- no-contact orders, ranging from one semester up to and including "through graduation"
- suspension or expulsion from university housing, ranging from one semester up to and including "through graduation"
- educational programming which may include, but is not limited to, completion of reflection essays and/or enrollment in a Sexual Assault Counseling and Education program with Tuttleman Counseling
- suspension or expulsion from the university, ranging from one semester up to and including several years or permanently.

Assistance for Individuals Who Experience Sexual Misconduct

Temple University is committed to ensuring that individuals who experience sexual misconduct, including sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual exploitation, have access to supportive resources, protections, and accommodations.

University internal investigations, disciplinary actions, and remedial measures operate independently of any civil, criminal, or external administrative proceedings. The university may conduct an investigation, implement remedial action, and impose disciplinary sanctions—even if criminal prosecution is pending, dismissed, or charges have been reduced.

Coordinated Support and Safety Measures

Regardless of whether an individual chooses to report sexual misconduct to law enforcement, Temple University provides cooperative support through multiple university offices, including:

- Title IX Coordinator
- Department of Public Safety
- Tuttleman Counseling Services
- Wellness Resource Center
- Victim advocate in the Department of Public Safety

With the individual's cooperation and consent, these offices work together to work cooperatively to ensure that the individual's health, physical safety, and academic status are protected. For example, if reasonably available, an individual may be offered changes to academic, work, or living situations in addition to counseling, health services and assistance in notifying appropriate local law enforcement, if so desired.

Student counseling services are available at Tuttleman Counseling Services (<https://counseling.temple.edu>). Within Tuttleman Counseling Services, if requested, the Sexual Assault

Counseling and Education (SACE) coordinator can coordinate assistance and support for persons who report having experienced sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, and/or other forms of sexual harassment, including coordination of matters relating to the person's physical and mental health, personal safety, and academic status. The SACE coordinator can keep conversations and interactions with victims of sexual misconduct confidential.

An individual who has experienced sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual exploitation, or other forms of sexual harassment can obtain additional support through the Wellness Resource Center (<https://wellness.temple.edu>) or the university's Title IX Coordinator located in 1810 Liacouras Walk, 5th Floor, Philadelphia, PA 19122.

Due to various reporting requirements, the Office of Equal Opportunity Compliance personnel and the Title IX Coordinator will handle all information they receive discreetly, however, their interactions with a complainant are not confidential.

Protection from abuse orders may be available through an appropriate court. Public Safety can also issue preliminary verbal directives requiring two parties not interact with one another.

Legal Protections and Stay-Away Directives

Individuals may request a Protection from Abuse Order through an appropriate court.

Additionally, Public Safety may issue preliminary verbal directives, requiring two parties to avoid interaction.

Policies Concerning Students and Employees with Criminal Records

Temple University does not conduct background investigations on prospective students. However, if information related to a prospective student's criminal conduct is disclosed during the application process, it is given appropriate consideration.

Currently enrolled students who are charged with or convicted of a criminal offense are subject to the university's ***Student Conduct Code*** and may face the full range of available disciplinary sanctions.

Employment Background Checks

Temple University employs 7,623 non-student employees and conducts background checks for individuals recommended for hire in certain selected positions.

Examples of positions requiring background checks include:

- Financially sensitive roles, such as billers, medical receptionists/schedulers, and cashiers.
- Positions requiring driving, such as drivers, coaches, and refuse haulers.
- Roles involving work with minors.
- Safety-sensitive positions, including security officers and police officers.
- Jobs granting access to student living areas.

Scope of Background Checks

Depending on the position, background checks may include:

- Criminal history review
- Civil litigation check
- Driving record verification
- Child abuse clearance
- Credit/bankruptcy screening
- Drug/alcohol testing

A full list of positions subject to background checks is available through Temple University's Human Resources Department.



Evaluation of Background Check Results

Information obtained through the background check process will be carefully reviewed based on:

- The essential duties of the position.
- The nature and gravity of any reported incident(s).
- The time elapsed since the incident(s).
- Remedial actions taken by the individual.
- The potential impact of the incident(s) on the individual's ability to safely and effectively perform job responsibilities.

A background check does not automatically disqualify an applicant from further consideration. The university assesses results in the context of surrounding circumstances before making hiring decisions.



Commitment to Fire Safety Education and Preparedness

Fires pose serious risks to life, property, and campus continuity, making fire safety an essential priority in university life. At Temple University, we approach this challenge through prevention, education, and preparedness. With comprehensive safety protocols, routine fire drills, and trained emergency response teams, we strive to create a secure environment for all students, faculty, and staff. A well-informed and actively engaged community is critical—by following safety guidelines and staying alert, everyone helps maintain a campus that is not only protected, but genuinely safeguarded.

- **Automatic sprinkler systems**
- **Building alarm systems**, monitored by **Temple Police**
- **Fire extinguishers** strategically placed throughout buildings
- **Fire-rated doors** for added protection

Fire Drills and Emergency Preparedness

To ensure students are familiar with evacuation procedures and safety protocols, Temple University conducts fire drills four times per year in each residence hall (except our international residence). These drills also take place at:

- **Kardon Apartments**
- **University Village**

Regular fire drills help students respond effectively in the event of an actual fire, reinforcing Temple's commitment to **campus safety and emergency readiness**.

Prohibited Items in Residential Halls

To prevent fire or spread of fire, the following items are prohibited in the residential halls (for a full list, see <https://housing.temple.edu/resources-and-services/rights-and-responsibilities>).

- Appliances or any item with electrical wiring that is homemade or has been altered
- Appliances whose instructions state “do not operate when empty” (i.e., coffee makers, sandwich presses, blenders, and slow cookers.)
- Automobile batteries and acids
- Candles, incense, wax melts, oil burners or any devices using halogen bulbs or exposed heating elements
- Ceiling fans/track lights
- Coffee machines (without hot plate/exposed warming element permitted, automatic shutoff required)
- Coffee mug warmers
- Decorative lights with adhesive backing
- Deep fat/air fryers
- Electric blankets/electric mattress pads/covers
- Lithium Ion Powered Mobility Devices (e.g. E-Bikes, E-Scooters and E-Skateboards)
- Electronic cigarettes/vape pens
- Explosives/Fireworks
- Flammable or combustible liquids (including art supplies such as thinner, etc.)
- Gasoline and/or gasoline-powered items
- Grills (any size—electric, gas, or charcoal)
- Halogen lamps
- Hookah/pipes/torches
- Hot pots, immersion coils, hot plates, burners, portable stoves, or any kitchen appliance in a bedroom
- Items likely to overload a standard wall outlet or that required a dedicated circuit—including but not limited to, air conditioners (unless provided by the University), space heaters, heat lamps, music amplifiers, etc.
- Natural-cut trees, branches, or greens, other natural decorations, such as pumpkins/gourds
- Personal microwaves (except for kitchen area of apartment-style rooms in Temple Towers, Morgan Halls, and 1300); micro-fridge combination units, acquired through the Temple-selected vendor, are permitted in student rooms
- Space heaters (ceramic, electric, kerosene)
- Toaster ovens, toasters, woks, rice cookers, broilers, popcorn poppers, and other cooking appliances (except when used in the kitchen area of apartment style rooms in Temple Towers, Morgan Hall, and 1300)
- Wall hangings made of burlap or any other flammable fabrics, tapestries, fish netting, etc. are prohibited.

Temple University prioritizes fire safety and risk prevention in all residential spaces. Compliance with these regulations is mandatory to maintain a safe living environment.

Smoking and Tobacco Use Policy

Temple University is committed to maintaining a tobacco-free environment for all members of the campus community. The university's tobacco-free campus policy applies to all U.S. Temple University facilities, properties, and vehicles—whether owned or leased—regardless of location. Residential living offers students opportunities to develop independence and build a strong, connected community. By following fire-safety regulations and residence hall policies, students contribute to a safe, positive environment for themselves and their peers.

Tobacco-Free Campus Policy

Tobacco use, including smoking, is strictly prohibited on all Temple University U.S. campus properties, including but not limited to:

Indoor Spaces

- Offices
- Classrooms
- Hallways
- Waiting rooms
- Restrooms
- Meeting rooms
- Common areas
- Performance venues
- Residential spaces within university housing

Outdoor Campus Property

- Parking lots
- Loading docks
- Covered entrances
- Walkways, paths, and plazas
- Fields and recreational spaces
- Sports facilities and stadiums

Vehicles

- All Temple-owned or leased vehicles in the U.S., regardless of location

Additionally, tobacco use is prohibited on public sidewalks and streets within twenty (20) feet of any Temple University building entrance.

Responsibility for Compliance

All students, faculty, administrators, staff, and visitors are expected to cooperate to ensure compliance with this tobacco-free policy.

Violations of this policy will be handled as follows:

- Students – Addressed under the ***Student Conduct Code***
- Residential Students – Managed by the residential judicial system
- Employees – Addressed in accordance with the Employee Manual and applicable workplace regulations

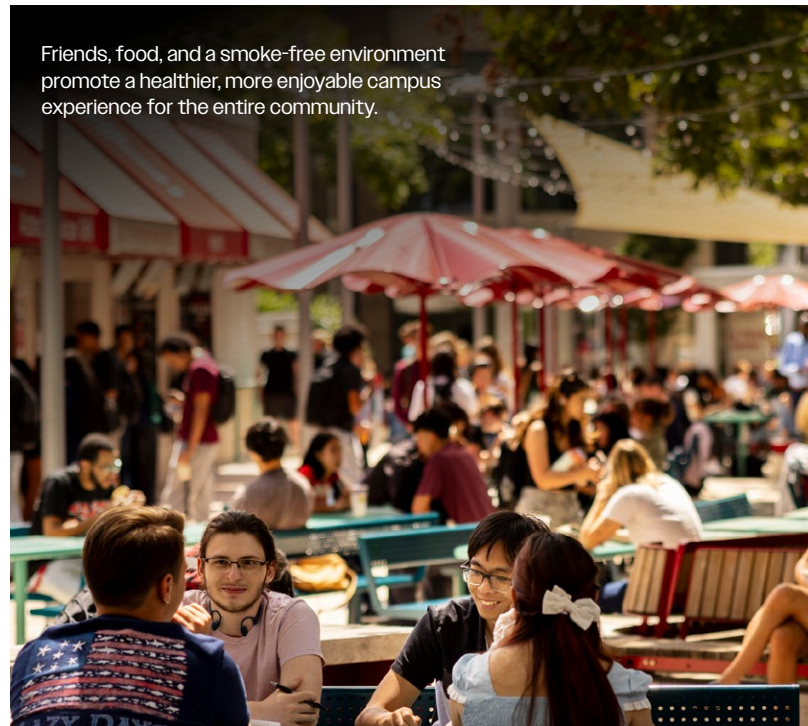
Temple University remains dedicated to promoting a healthy campus environment and ensuring adherence to tobacco-free policies.

Procedures for Evacuating Student Housing in Case of Fire

Temple University prioritizes fire safety and emergency preparedness in its on-campus student housing facilities. All residents must follow evacuation procedures to ensure safety during a fire emergency.

Evacuation Protocols for Residence Halls

- All on-campus student housing facilities, except Morgan Hall (North and South), must fully evacuate immediately upon activation of the fire alarm.



Friends, food, and a smoke-free environment promote a healthier, more enjoyable campus experience for the entire community.

- In Morgan Hall (North and South), the fire alarm system will announce specific evacuation instructions, directing evacuation from:
 - The floor where the alarm was activated
 - The floors directly above and below the alarm
 - Remaining floors should await further instructions from the Fire Marshal or university personnel before evacuating.

Immediate Actions if You Discover a Fire

1. Sound the building fire alarm immediately.
2. Know the location of alarm signal stations and how they operate.
3. Security officers stationed in the lobby will call Temple Police upon alarm activation.
4. Temple Police will notify the Fire Department by dialing 9-1-1 without delay.

Evacuation Steps Upon Hearing the Fire Alarm

- **Leave the building immediately** and close all doors behind you.
- **Proceed to the designated fire exits** to evacuate.
- **Do not use elevators.** They will stop if power fails, causing occupants to become trapped. Elevator shafts are like chimneys. Smoke could enter the elevator shaft thereby asphyxiating the occupants trying to evacuate the building.
- **Use the stairs.**

Guidelines for Safe Evacuation

Before opening a door:

- Feel the door for heat before opening.
- Check for smoke seeping through cracks.
- If the door is hot or smoke is present, do not open it—seal off cracks and call for help.

If you become trapped in your room:

- Keep the door closed and seal any cracks to prevent smoke infiltration.
- Call the Fire Department (9-1-1) or Temple Police (215) 204-1234.
- Provide your exact location, including floor and room number.

If the door feels cool and the corridor is clear:

- Open the door cautiously—if smoke or heat pressure is present, close it immediately.
- Proceed with your escape plan only if the corridor is safe.

Post-Evacuation Protocol

- After exiting the building, move at least 200 feet away and proceed to the designated rally point.
- Do not reenter the building until given permission by Temple Police or the Fire Department.

Evacuation Procedures for Individuals with Mobility Limitations

Individuals with mobility limitations should:

- Plan to relocate to an **Area of Refuge** (see page 15) or an exit stair landing if evacuation is required.
- If possible, call for assistance:
 - **Temple Police: (215) 204-1234**
 - **Fire Department: 9-1-1**
- Identify your floor and location and indicate if you require special equipment to descend the stairs.
- Be aware that the Fire Department will assist but may need additional time to reach you.
- As part of your personal preparedness, please think about and develop a plan to address your needs in advance of any emergency.

Fire Safety Tips

If caught in smoke or extreme heat:

- Stay low to the ground, where air is clearer.
- Take short breaths through your nose until you reach an **Area of Refuge**.

The University Fire Marshal oversees and manages fire prevention activities and procedures within all campus buildings.



Keep all fire exit and corridor doors closed at all times. These are fire-rated to prevent smoke and heat from entering stairways and adjoining corridors. If you observe fire exit doors propped open, close them and report the location to the University Fire Marshal: (215) 204-7938.

Fire Safety Education

Temple University is dedicated to fire prevention, emergency preparedness, and the safety of all students and employees. The university implements fire safety education and protocols across campus housing and facilities.

In Residence Halls

The Fire Marshal conducts fire drills in all Temple University residence halls four times per year to ensure students understand proper evacuation procedures.

If a student encounters a fire that has not already triggered the alarm, they should activate the fire alarm as they exit if they can do so safely.

Other Campus Buildings

Fire drills are conducted annually in non-residential campus buildings to reinforce emergency response protocols.

Student Evacuation Procedures

In the event of a fire, students are instructed to:

1. **Immediately leave hazardous areas** using established evacuation routes.
2. **Proceed to the designated rally point** before calling 9-1-1 for help.
3. **Remain at the rally point** until an “all-clear” announcement is given.

Additionally, Temple Police and security officers are designated and trained to assist with safe and orderly emergency evacuations for all types of emergencies. These personnel help direct students and employees during evacuations and serve as resources for emergency procedures.

Reporting a Fire for Statistical Purposes

Under federal law, Temple University is required to disclose statistical data on all fires occurring in on-campus student housing facilities.

To report fires that have already been extinguished, contact:

Future Improvements in Fire Safety

The Temple University Fire Prevention Plan (FPP) applies to all operations in the university where employees and students may encounter a fire. This FPP is in place at the university to control and reduce the possibility of fire and to specify the type of equipment to use in case of fire.

Under this plan, employees and students will be informed of the plan’s purpose, preferred means of reporting fires and other emergencies, types of evacuations to be used in various emergency situations, and the alarm systems. The FPP communicates to employees and students policies and procedures to follow when fires erupt. This written plan is available, upon request, to employees and students, their designated representatives, and any Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) officials who ask to see it. The written program is kept in the Fire Marshal’s Office. The plan is periodically reviewed and updated. Copies of this plan may be obtained from the Fire Marshal’s Office and the Workers’ Compensation Manager.

Temple University is committed to the success of the FPP, striving for clear understanding, safe behavior, and involvement in the program for everyone. 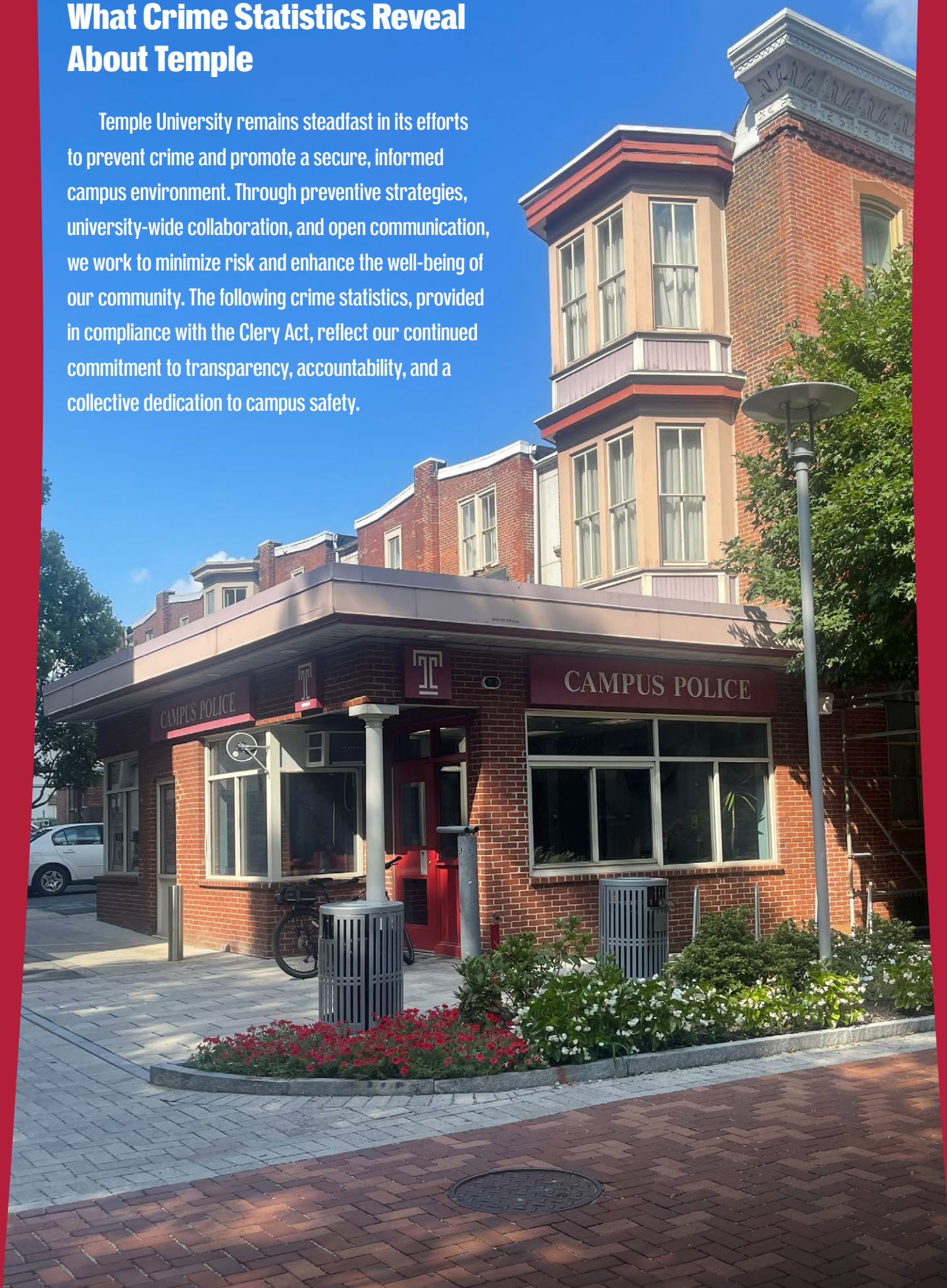

Commitment to Clarity: What Crime Statistics Reveal About Temple

Temple University remains steadfast in its efforts to prevent crime and promote a secure, informed campus environment. Through preventive strategies, university-wide collaboration, and open communication, we work to minimize risk and enhance the well-being of our community. The following crime statistics, provided in compliance with the Clery Act, reflect our continued commitment to transparency, accountability, and a collective dedication to campus safety.





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Crime Rates and Statistics

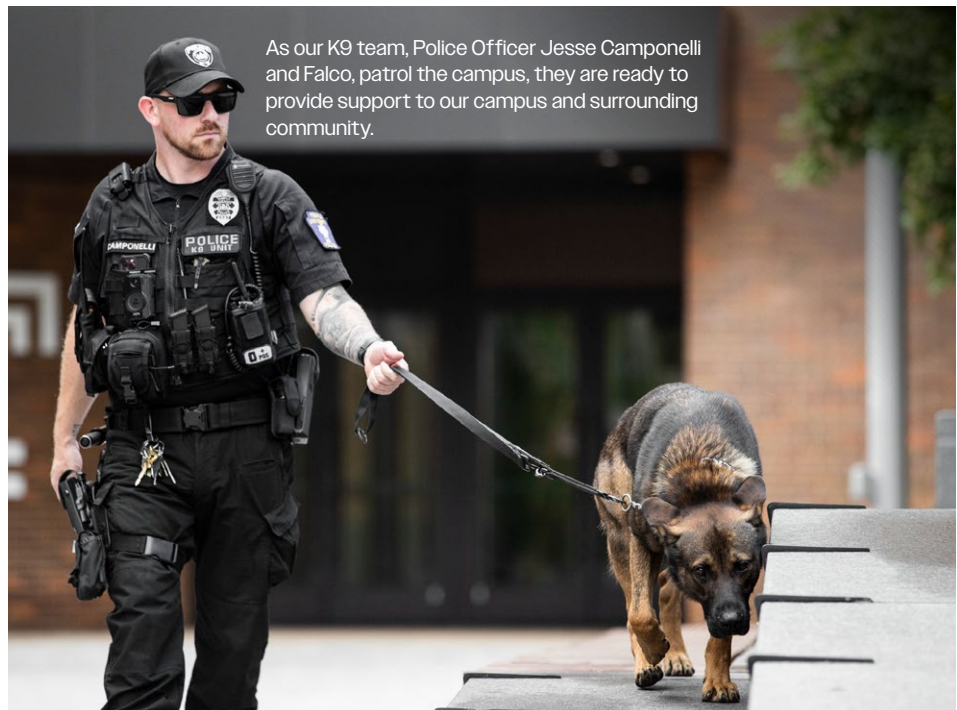
The Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act—formerly the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act [20 U.S.C. § 1092(f)]—is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses. The following pages provide definitions, crime rates and statistics for each of Temple's campuses for the 2024, 2023, and 2022 calendar years as required by federal law. The Clery Act requires that the following "Clery crimes" be reported:

Criminal Homicide

Murder and Non-negligent

Manslaughter is the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. This offense includes any death caused by injuries received in a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or the commission of a crime. This offense does NOT include traffic fatalities, suicides, accidental deaths, or justifiable homicide as defined by law.

Manslaughter by negligence is the killing of another person through gross negligence. This offense includes any death caused by the gross negligence of another. This offense does NOT include death of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities.



As our K9 team, Police Officer Jesse Camponelli and Falco, patrol the campus, they are ready to provide support to our campus and surrounding community.

Aggravated Assault

Aggravated Assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Examples of Aggravated Assault include, but are not limited to, poisonings (including the use of date rape drugs), assault with disease (as in cases when the offender is aware that he or she is infected with a deadly disease and deliberately attempts to inflict the disease). If an attack results in broken bones, loss of consciousness or significant blood loss, or requires medical treatment or hospitalization, such as stitches or castings (regardless of whether the victim accepts such assistance), the incident must be classified as an Aggravated Assault.

Sexual Assault (Sex Offenses)

Rape is the penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus, with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. This offense includes the rape of both males and females.

Fondling is the touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Statutory Rape is sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent. If force was used or threatened, or if the victim was incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or temporary or permanent mental impairment, the offense is Rape, not Statutory Rape. In Pennsylvania, children less than 13 years old cannot grant consent to sexual activity.



Strong partnerships are the foundation of public safety. Through professionalism, clear communication, and mutual respect, Security Officer Denise Lucas and Sgt. Christopher Derosé work together to effectively manage their responsibilities and help promote the safety and security of all.

Teens between the ages of 13 and 15 cannot consent to sexual activity with anyone who is four or more years older than them. People ages 16 and older can legally consent to sexual activity, so long as the other person does not have authority over them as defined in Pennsylvania's institutional sexual assault statute.

Incest is sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Burglary

Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. This includes all offenses that are classified by local law enforcement agencies as Burglary, as well as all offenses where force of any kind is used to unlawfully enter a structure for the purpose of committing a theft or felony; unlawful trespass of a structure with no force such as through an unlocked door or window for the purpose of committing a theft or felony; and attempted forcible entry where the totality of the facts indicate that a Burglary was in fact attempted. Examples of offenses that are NOT classified as Burglary include thefts from automobiles, shoplifting, thefts from areas of open access, and robbery.

Robbery

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear. To be classified as Robbery, the offense must be committed in the presence of the victim; the victim must be directly confronted by the perpetrator; the victim must be threatened with force or put in fear that force will be used; and the offense must involve a theft or larceny.

Motor Vehicle Theft

Motor Vehicle Theft is the theft or attempted theft of any self-propelled motor vehicle that runs on a land surface and not on rails. This offense includes all incidents where a vehicle is taken by person(s) not having lawful access even if the vehicle is later abandoned, such as "joyriding." This offense does NOT include theft of farm equipment, bulldozers, airplanes, construction equipment, or watercraft.

Arson

Arson is any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Arson includes incidents where an individual willfully or maliciously burns his or her own property. Accidental fires such as a cooking fire are not included in this offense.

VAWA Offenses

Dating Violence

Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

Dating Violence includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse.

Dating Violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.

Domestic Violence

A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:

- a current or former spouse of intimate partner of the victim;
- a person with whom the victim shares a child in common;
- a person who is cohabiting with, or has cohabited with, the victim as a spouse or intimate partner;
- a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred;
- any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

Stalking

Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or suffer substantial emotional distress.

Course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means, follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, or interferes with a person's property.

Reasonable person means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim.

Substantial emotional distress means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or professional treatment or counseling.

Hazing

Hazing is classified as a Clery-reportable offense under the Stop Campus Hazing Act. Reportable hazing includes conduct that causes, or is reasonably likely to cause, bodily injury through physical, mental, or sexual brutality, forced consumption, or other coercive activities. Incidents meeting Clery reporting thresholds are included in this statistical section.

Arrests and Referrals for Disciplinary Action

Under the Clery Act, institutions must report arrests and referrals for disciplinary action for liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession.

- Arrest: Persons processed by arrest, citation or summons.
- Referred for disciplinary action: The referral of any person to any official who initiates a disciplinary action of which a record is established, and which may result in the imposition of a sanction. This includes only alleged violations of law, not violations of your institution's policies.

Liquor Law Violations

Liquor Law Violations are defined as the violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness. This offense does include, amongst other violations, underage possession, furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person, using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor, and any attempts to commit these offenses.

Drug Law Violations

Drug Law Violations are defined as the violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation

or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs. This offense includes illegally obtaining prescription drugs; however, it does NOT include use of legally obtained personal prescription drugs used by the owner in a manner that is not consistent with the instructions provided by the prescribing physician.

Weapons Law Violations

Weapon Law Violations are defined as the violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices or other deadly weapons. This classification encompasses weapons offenses that are regulatory in nature.
